A stop and go light with through traffic on 12 Mile during the daytime.

THE LAST MULTIPLE traffic fatality occurred in January of this year when two teenage girls were killed in a head-on crash on 12 Mile Road in front of St. Gabriel's Church in Farmington Township. Prior to that accident, Michigan State Police records showed 11 persons were killed in seven fatal accidents during 1953, in the last cases of multiple traffic deaths since 1937.

Last year's traffic death toll in Farmington set an all-time high of 12.

Nahstoll Designated

At its regular meeting Monday night the Farmington Board of Education elected George A. Nahstoll as Designated to study Oakland Schools Budget. Nahstoll is also treasurer of the board.

Superintendent Harris would amount to 87 per cent for personal items. He stated that the budget had been based on an increased enrollment of 1,000 students and 40 additional staff members. He offered a further breakdown of expenditures compared to the Oakland County average for 1953-1954:

Most questions asked by the audience were informational and were clarified by members of the board and school administrators present.

Mrs. B. of Highmeadow PTA questioned why there was no provision made for a reading constant or specialist in the district. Mr. George Strelecuk of Farmington Meadows subdivision questioned the fact that the district employs unlicensed junior operators even though licensed operators are not required by law; and Mr. William Van Del of Longacre PTA asked questions regarding purchasing practices and policies.

All questions having been answered to the apparent satisfaction of the audience, the board then officially adopted the budget.

Traffic Study

The Michigan State Highway Department expects to be the Farmington City Council this week that a traffic survey completed at Power Road and Grand River Avenue in the city revealed the intersection did not meet the highway department's requirements for installation of a traffic light.

The council had sought to have the highway department place a traffic signal at Power and Grand River Avenue in order to allow for a break in the flow of traffic along Grand River between Farmington Road and Orchard Lake Road. The city has expressed the desire for the light at Power Road and the intersection of Grand River Avenue between Farmington Road and Orchard Lake Road.

REQUIREMENTS set for the installation of a traffic light by the highway dept. are a minimum of 150 cars on a minor road and 600 cars on a major road. Grand River Avenue exceeds the minimum requirements from 7 a.m. through 9 p.m., showing a peak of over 1,200 cars at 5 p.m.

The City Manager, John Dinan, and Director of the Public Safety Department, Maurice Ford, will meet with highway officials this week for a review of the traffic conditions on Grand River Avenue in the city.

The city feels a traffic light is definitely needed along the stretch of road between Farmington and Orchard Lake roads in order to make turning movements on Grand River Avenue from residential intersections less hazardous.

If a mutual agreement cannot be made with the highway dept., the city may be forced into carrying the entire cost burden for installing and maintaining a traffic light at Power and Grand River Avenue.

two local groups of senior citizens.

The council expressed a desire to cooperate with any effort aimed at providing the community's senior citizens with more recreational activities. It was pointed out by councilman Sandy Bratherton that facilities are available to the senior citizens at what he termed very reasonable rent and a program might be commenced in the future whereby a full time director of recreation could handle activities under such a program.

At the present time, it was pointed out by Bratherton, the City participants with the township in support of the Farmington Area Recreation Commission's summer program for youngsters. It was suggested that when and if the city ever undertakes a separate program, a special state of activities could be included for senior citizens.

Added-Fringe Benefits for City Employees

Fringe benefits for Farmington City employees were approved by the City Council at its regular meeting Monday night, July 6, confirming action approved by the council during its budget deliberations.

The additional employee benefits and alterations in personnel work schedules cover three items: two of which pertain only to the Department of Public Works and the Water and Sewer Department.

UNDER THE NEW benefits, the work week of the DPW and the W & S Dept. will be reduced from a 44 hour week to a 40 hour week, eight hours per day, Monday through Friday. Overtime and call-back will be at a night \$2.50 per hour, excluding supervisors, instead of the present \$2 an hour overtime or call-back rate.

All city employees who have worked for the city ten years will now be entitled to three weeks vacation each year in lieu of the two weeks presently being allowed.

Plan to Sell Church Magazines in City

A request from the Seventh Day Adventist Church for permission to sell magazines in the city came before the city council at their regular meeting Monday night, July 6, and it was determined that there is no restriction against persons selling 10 years of age selling magazines of a religious nature.

City Manager John Dinan was authorized by the council to permit the request and waive the \$15 per year or \$3 per day Peddler Solicitor License fee, which it was felt would be a prohibitive cost for these children to pay from the proceeds of the sale of magazines.

In 1954, a new Pirsch Pumper was purchased, a 750 gallon per minute pump and 150 gallon water tank mounted on a GMC chassis.

1963 saw a new Mack Pumper, a 1,000 gallon per minute pumper and a 1,000 gallon tank with all the latest accessories and nozzles.

The increase in population and building also called for more water mains which also called for new hydrants, located in fire marsh areas.

Now, the man that man this equipment are all Department of Public Safety personnel. There are 15 men available at once in case of a large fire. All these men are qualified fire fighters. They have spent months of training at fire fighters' training schools. They know how to handle the equipment, also the fire.
