## To Seek Post On Twp. Board

Martin E. Gluckstein of 52407 Chesterbrook in Farmington has announced he will seek the Democratic nomination for township trustee in the primaries on Sept. 1. Active in township affairs for the past eight years, he previously served on a special committee to investigate the effects incorporation would have on the Township. He also has served on the board of directors of Farmington Township League of Subdivision Associations and as an organizer of the West-brooke Manor Association.

Gluckstein's decision to again run for the Township Board was motivated by what he describes as "a need to place on the Board independent, dedicated people to whom the public's welfare is primary and who are not afraid to stand solely for this end."

Gluckstein charged that "during my five years of attendance at Board meetings, I have seen the conduct of township affairs degenerate until sound and equitable processes have all but vanished. And this Board, a public body, has assumed the nature of a private club, tending to operate for the special interests of political cronies. I would hope, if I am nominated, that my opponents will have the sincerity of purpose to publicly debate the issues prior to the November election. Perhaps some of the service, fraternal, women's, and religious societies in the Township would consider sponsoring such debates," he suggested.

DR. GLUCKSTEIN, a chemical engineer employed as a Supervisor by Ethyl Corporation's Detroit research laboratories, is the father of five children, four of whom attend Isaac Bond Elementary School. Born in Brooklyn, New York, he was educated at the University of Michigan, receiving the Bachelor and Master of Science in Engineering and Doctor of Philosophy degrees. He is also a Registered Professional Engineer and a member of several professional and honorary societies.

Gluckstein has expressed a willingness to discuss his candidacy and program for responsible Township government with any and all who are interested. His phone number is GR. 4-2586.

## Have Vaccines Now Available For Measles

A vaccine is now available from local physicians for the immunization against measles. Health authorities said all persons who have not yet been vaccinated against measles to contact their family doctor and procure the shots.

Surgeon General Luther L. Terry, chief of the U. S. Public Health Service, reported his agency has learned of 61 cases of "sleeping sickness" due to measles this year. He urges parents to have children vaccinated against measles so that their youngsters won't be exposed to this needless risk. "The measles vaccine," he emphasized, "have been proven safe and effective."

Measles encephalitis, a type of sleeping sickness which results when the virus that causes regular nine-day measles invades the victim's brain, often leads to permanent brain damage in those afflicted. The agency said up to 32-per cent of those who develop measles encephalitis die and "survivors of this complication are fortunate if they escape severe or permanent brain damage."
