YWCA Lists 828 Members From Farmington Area

The Young Women's Christian Association of Metropolitan Detroit, a Torch Drive agency whose purpose is to develop to their fullest capacity as individuals and as leaders, girls and women from seven communities.

THE YW PROGRAM starts with sub-teen girls, helping them to live and work and play together. Teen-agers prepare for a future by serving others and preparing for responsible citizenship. Mothers are provided with a "Ladies Day Out" when they can enjoy themselves while their children are entertained.

Behind all YW activity is the purpose expressed by its founders more than 100 years ago: "to build a fellowship of women and girls devoted to the task of realizing in our common life the ideals of personal and social living to which we are committed by our faith as Christians."

During the past year, the YW of Metropolitan Detroit had a membership of 72,016. A total of 72,008 attended its various activities.

The YW program is carried out in six buildings and a camp. The buildings are at 2320 Withersell St., 13130 Woodward Ave., 2520 Grand River, 3211 Fort St., Wyandotte; 1530 E. Ten Mile Rd., East Detroit; and 839 South Crooks Road, Clawson. The camp is on Lake Huron, 4 1/2 miles north of Lexington, Michigan.

The YWCA of Metropolitan Detroit is the second largest YW in the country. In 1953 its Dearborn Branch, at 1034 Monroe Boulevard, became a separate agency known as the YWCA of Western Wayne County, and was accepted for full membership in the National YWCA. It has 4,989 members.

The YWCA provides a home for hundreds of girls who come to Detroit every year with no

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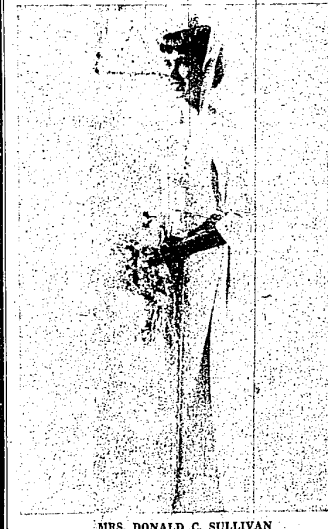
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
