

Stage Battle Royal In Duplicate Bridge

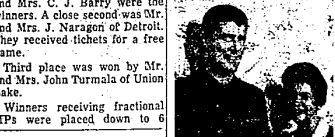

Flanders Has Well Attended Summer Library

A total of 257 boys and girls were registered to take part in the Flanders School summer library program, sponsored by the Flanders School P.P.A. It was announced this week.

Of this total number there were 45 pre-school age children and 144 pupils from private and parochial schools signed up.

The library was open for eight weeks this summer during the hours from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. from June 22 through August 14.

The program was under the supervision of Mrs. Wilma Lochmann, a professional librarian. Each week there were three story hours. There were one for pre-school age children 4 and 5; another for boys and girls in school ages 5 and 6 and a third for 7 and 8 year olds. In addition to this there was a reading club for pupils in grades 3 through 6.

The average story hour attendance was 16 and the story hour for pre-schoolers proved most popular with an average attendance of 21.

There was a total of 1,039 books circulated during the 8 weeks. The average daily attendance at the library for the summer program was 45.
