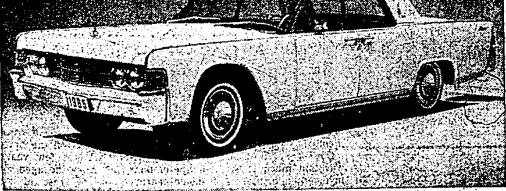

The Oakland County Planning Commission is currently conducting a survey of wholesaling facilities within the county.

Primary types of goods distributed by Oakland County wholesale firms; Future of Oakland County's role as a wholesale distribution center in Michigan. What factors favor the establishment of certain types of wholesale firms in the county; and the effect the centralization of wholesaling facilities by large firms has on the wholesaling activity of Oakland County in terms of employment and payroll.

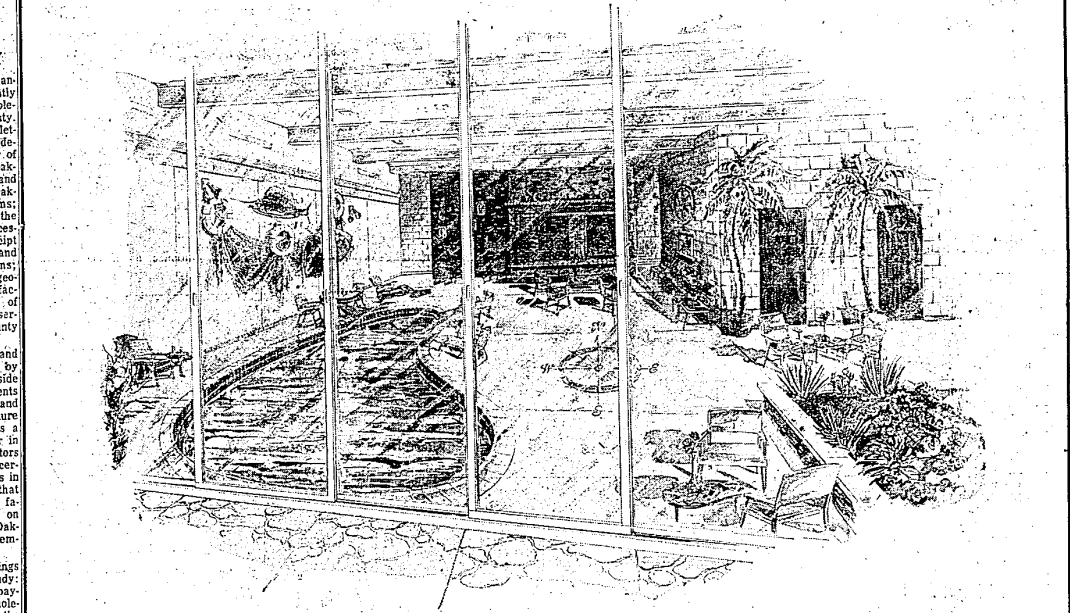
