By Michigan Law Landowners Don't Have Absolute Rights

(Editor's note: This is a public service article explaining in general terms a provision of Michigan law. Individuals who wish to determine the effect of landowners in this State do so on their own private legal affairs should consult a private attorney.)

Can you put a sign on your property barring entry and enforcement of force by anyone? Contrary to popular belief, landowners in this State do not have absolute right over the use of their property.

Many people are unaware that highway personnel, when making surveys, can encroach on private property without violating the law.

The State Legislature enacted a law in 1957 which authorizes state and county highway personnel to enter any land and waters in Michigan to make necessary surveys, soundings and borings for the planning, construction and maintenance of state trunkline highways and county roads.

The act, however, makes the state and county authorities fully liable for any actual damage done to the premises by the surveyors. Fences, trees and shrubbery cannot be removed for survey purposes without the written consent of the property owner.

Thus, the property owner is amply protected by the law and is guaranteed against financial loss, while the state is permitted to perform its service.

Clerk, Carrier Exams Being Offered by P.O.

Henry Trombley, Farmington Postmaster, has announced that Civil Service examinations for the positions of Post Office Clerks and Carriers are being offered for interested Farmington residents.

Applicants for these positions must actually reside in Farmington. The minimum age limit is 18, and there is no maximum age limit. Starting salaries for accepted applicants will be \$2.48 per hour.

It is important that applicants understand the duties required in the position for which they make application.

CLERKS handle heavy sacks of letter mail, paper mail, and parcel post weighing up to 80 pounds. They sort and distribute mail to Post Offices and to carrier routes in accordance with established schemes. The work involves continuous standing, throwing of mail, stretching, and reaching. All newly appointed substitute clerks will probably work evening and night hours. Reporting times may be irregular and employees may end their tours of duty during the early hours of the morning.

CARRIERS are responsible for the prompt and efficient delivery and collection of mail in foot or by vehicle under varying conditions in a prescribed area or on various routes. They must serve in all kinds of weather and may be required to drive motor vehicles and make collections of mail from various boxes in the street. They may be required to carry on their shoulders loads weighing as much as 35 pounds and to load and unload full sacks of mail from trucks.

Any who wish to apply for the Civil Service Examination for the positions outlined above are asked to pick up Card Form 5000-AB at the Post Office, 32300 Bloomer, off Farmington Road, Hill City, and mail it to Executive Secretary, Board of U.S. Civil Service Examinations, Room 123, Federal Building, Detroit, Michigan 48223.
