Raiders Blank Trojans In Football Opener 13-0

The North Farmington Varsity football squad opened the 1964 season with a 13-0 blanking of Clarencville Friday night, September 23. Raiders rolled to their third victory over Clarencville in as many years on a muddy rain-soaked field that kept the scoring down.

Conservatively neither team was effective in the first quarter with the rain causing several fumbles and making the field very slippery.

In the second quarter North Farmington took the upper hand and drove to the Clarencville 11 yard line; only to lose the ball on a fumble. With less than three minutes left in the first half, the Raiders drew first blood when Bob Linderman sprinted into the end zone for a touchdown. The extra point attempt failed when the ball hit the crossbar of the goal post and North Farmington led 6-0 at the half.

In the third quarter neither team could muster a sustained drive and the score remained 6-0 going into the last quarter. In the fourth quarter John McDonald crossed the goal line for the final touchdown of the game. Trausch booted the extra point to make the score 13-0. With only minutes to play, line-backer Jerry Pound intercepted a Clarencville pass at mid-field and carried it to within the 30 yard line. When the Raiders failed to take it, Tom Trausch attempted a field goal that was deflected wide by a Clarencville lineman. Time ran out before Clarencville could begin to move with the final score 13-0.

The most outstanding feature of the game was the North Farmington defensive unit.

The Farmington Rockets Junior Varsity football team matched their second victory of the season Sunday, September 20, by defeating the East Detroit Mid-Jets, 7-0, on the loser's field.

Victory over East Detroit Sunday was especially sweet as it has been ten years since the East Detroit Mid-Jets have been beaten by the Farmington Rockets.

With the initial kick-off, it was soon evident that the Rockets were the better team as they moved the ball from their own 31-yard-line to the Mid-Jets' 15 yard line. It was here that East Detroit's defense stiffened and the Rockets lost the ball on downs.

THE ROCKETS' defensive team then went to work and a fumble was recovered by John Weiss giving the ball back to the Rockets. Again the Rockets knocked on East Detroit's goal line but failed to score as the quarter ended.

At the start of the second quarter, East Detroit was forced to punt and Greg Dhue returned the ball to the 12 yard line. Two attempts failed in the line and then Greg Dhue passed to Tom Kempf who went out of bounds on the 2 yard line.

GREG DHUE then faked a hand-off and rolled to his left crossing the goal line for six points. The extra point was converted on a plunge by Mike Gow.

Although there wasn't any scoring in the second half, a great deal of credit must be given to the defensive team who kept East Detroit in their own territory the entire game.

The Rockets' defense has held their opponents scoreless in their first two games. Especially outstanding on defense were Greg Parmelee, Jim Harlie and Mark Briolat.

from the one-foot line. The try for extra point failed, but the Falcons held a surprisingly 19-0 lead.

Bentley started to show an offense for the first time in the game during the fourth quarter, but to no avail as Falcon Mike Perry picked off a Bentley pass to stop the only penetrating drive by the Bentley Bulldogs.

The Falcons then found themselves on their own two-yard line. Mike Wilson took over quarterback duties as starting

quarterback, Ron Cleveland, was injured. A fumble dropped the Falcons to their one. The Farmington team then attempted to punt the ball out of dangerous territory, but a bad hike from center resulted in a mad scramble in the end zone. A Falcon recovered the ball but it was a Bentley safety, which resulted in two points for the Bulldogs. The safety ended the scoring in the game and when the final gun sounded, the Falcons were the victors, 19-2.

The lack of weight didn't bother Farmington; they hit as
