MICHIGAN'S EDUCATIONAL programs got a going-over in Lansing last week when Edward McNamara, Livonia city Councilman and candidate for the State Senate (right) conferred with Dr. Lynn Bartlett, Superintendent of Public Instruction (left). The meeting was one of several scheduled with state leaders by McNamara, who is the Democratic nominee in the 14th Senate District in the April 5 election.

## McNamara Confers With State Officials

Democratic State Senate candidate, Edward H. McNamara, found his campaign trail winding into the State Capitol, last Thursday, as he conferred with State officials on the needs of the people of the 14th District. McNamara stated that he went to Lansing "on the invitation of several State Senators and other State-wide officials, to discuss current and proposed legislation and other programs affecting this area."

Secretary of State James M. Hare and McNamara, on, to outline his proposed traffic safety program. During the conference McNamara noted that "twenty States have periodic automobile inspection, and all of those States have better traffic safety records than Michigan's."

McNamara also pointed out that he endorsed proposals to find a methodology to reimburse people who were injured by uninsured motorists. "A method must be devised to compensate those innocent victims of automobile accidents, who themselves are well insured, but who find that the perpetrator of the accident is not only irresponsible, but also uninsured."

Earlier in the day McNamara met with Lynn M. Bartlett, Superintendent of Public Instruction, regarding Mr. Bartlett's proposals for increasing State aid to lower education in the 1965-66 fiscal year.

McNamara announced that he concurred at least in principle with Bartlett's enrichment program, which calls for an increase of \$80 million, plus an additional \$11.6 million already necessary to continue present programs.

McNamara stated that "Michi-

gan's greatest asset is her youth, and she can make no greater investment than in their future."

"There is a possibility of gaining an additional \$60 million from the new Federal Education bill, but to be eligible Michigan cannot reduce her present contribution to lower education," McNamara noted.

After a lengthy discussion with Dr. Ralph A. MacMullan, Director of the Michigan Department of Conservation, McNamara stated that he was "satisfied that the basic problem of low lake levels is deficient precipitation."

"The solution is rain — for forty days and forty nights, but unfortunately that is out of the hands of your State Senator," he jests.

McNamara expressed a desire to see the Conservation Department's program for rehabilitation and restocking of lakes in Southeastern Michigan speeded up. "Water is a very precious commodity to Michigan. Without it we cannot be the nation's Water Wonderland."

McNamara also conferred with State Senate Majority Leader, Raymond D. Drendzel, Senators Sander Levin, Roger Craig, William Bowman, and Representative Marvin Stempien regarding current legislation affecting the 14th District.

Drendzel stated, after the conference, that he is "aware of McNamara's wisdom and experience, and I look forward to having it on a permanent basis in the State Senate after the April 5 election."
