Student Busing Angers Parents

Protests from representatives of angry parents from the Kimberly North subdivision were heard by the Farmington Board of Education at their Monday meeting over the busing of children from the overcrowded Eagle school who will attend to Middlebelt elementary next September.

This action will affect about 100 children in the fourth, fifth and sixth grades. Three representatives carried the school administration and Board with discrimination in selecting their particular subdivision with the transfer. They demanded the "whys" to the move which they claimed were never answered at a meeting of the parents with Superintendent Gerald V. Harrison to explain the move.

Harrison explained that the transfer was made after much consideration and offered to restate his previous explanation. He said that the goal of the schools is to keep all children on full days; that Kimberly North was the newest subdivision in the area; and that economy reasons demanded that the buses go into one area only and transport children to a different school.

Representatives of the subdivision wanted a review of the situation. They also offered two possible solutions which were unacceptable to school policy. Mrs. C. M. Dunham, who attended the meeting along with her husband, suggested that the entire grade be moved to keep classroom friends together.
