

Suburbs' Easter Seal Drive Raises \$40,000

With Easter Sunday marking the climax of the annual Easter Seal Appeal on behalf of crippled children and adults, a total of \$40,025.57 has been contributed by residents of Western Wayne County.

And residents of Livonia, Garden City, Nankin Township, Redford Township and Plymouth are in the forefront of those who have given generously.

From Garden City, a total of \$1,626 has been contributed. Livonians have donated \$4,712.83. A total of \$2,945.79 has come from Plymouth residents. And Redford Township has contributed \$2,752.02 to the drive. In the Wayne-Nankin Township area, \$8,762.62 has been raised.

John J. Butler, General chairman of the 1965 Easter Seal Campaign, in commenting on the report, expressed his appreciation for the efforts of the local sponsoring groups, all of those who have helped in the many phases of the fund raising effort as well as to those who have made contributions.

"While fund-raising efforts are concentrated during the Easter season, the needs of crippled children and adults go on throughout the year," Butler pointed out. "This means that gifts are welcome at any time, and that those who have not yet sent a contribution may still do so to help reach the goal of \$45,000 for our Western Wayne County service area. In some communities, the cost of mailing to everyone may have led to a restricted mailing list. Anyone who did not receive a mail appeal may send a contribution to the Easter Seal Society of Western Wayne County at P.O. Box No. 101, Inkster, or place it in one of the canisters still in banks or stores. Funds raised locally finance the Easter Seal Center near Middlebelt and Michigan; an information and referral service; the purchase of equipment for loan such as wheelchairs; a summer Day Camp for crippled children; classes and clubs for physically handicapped children and adults and other special services which no other agency provides. 500 crippled children and adults called on the Easter Seal Society of an affiliate of the National Society for Crippled Children and adults.

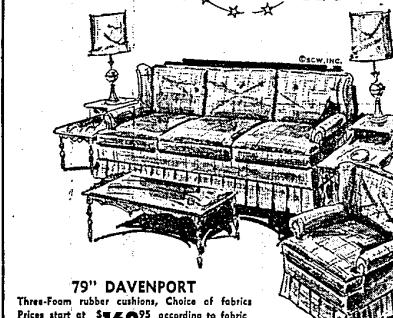

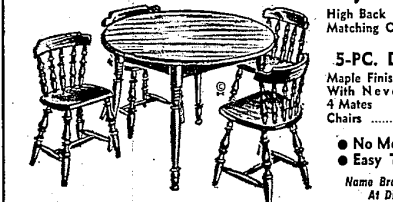

North Central Gives OK to Franklin Hi

G. Sutherland Hayden, Chairman of the Michigan State Commission of Colleges and Secondary Schools, has announced that Franklin High School has again been placed on the list of secondary schools approved for the 1964-65 school year by the Association. The action was taken at the annual meeting of the Association in Chicago, March 29-April 1.

Of the 312 Michigan member schools, 116 were fully accredited by North Central. The remaining 194 schools were advised or warned for one or more violations of the accreditation criteria.

Accreditation by the Association assures the community that the quality of staff, program, and facilities is at a level sufficiently high enough to compare favorably with high schools throughout the nineteen state areas served by the North Central Association.

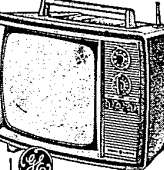

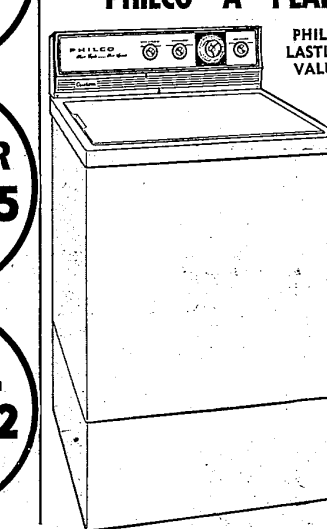
