The \$10,480 HTA Empress trot for four and five-year-old mares, headlines the Friday card and the return of Craig Creed, seeking his fifth straight win, will feature Saturday's \$3,000 Open Handicap Pace.

The Empress, a new event this year on the coast-to-coast program, was added to Northville's list of stakes. Northville was awarded the second leg of the rich series which culminates with a \$50,000 finale on Sept. 24 at Liberty Bell Park in Philadelphia. The series provides that a trotter must compete in at least four of the qualifiers and must be among the top 10 in points to gain the championship.
