Twenty-eight area students will receive a total of 1571 receiving degrees from the University of Michigan at the end of its first summer term according to an announcement by Erich A. Walter, secretary of the University.

Walter noted that the number of graduate students fulfilling degree requirements in August of this year corresponds exactly to the total number of students graduated in August 1954, 1,652. There were 619 undergraduates this summer.

Schoolcraft Plans Course On Business

In cooperation with the Small Business Administration, Schoolcraft College is offering an eight session Institute entitled "Management and Resources for Small Businessmen." According to Dean Dell Reed, the Institute will meet each Tuesday evening from 7 to 9:30 p.m., for an eight week period beginning Oct. 5.

The cost of the course is \$35 and includes tuition, certificate of attendance, and the graduation banquet during the final session.
