

1,000 Educators To Attend Talks at Schoolcraft

Claren Jones, chairman of the Schoolcraft College Planning Committee, stated Monday that pre-registration figures indicate that approximately 1,000 administrators and faculty members will attend the 31st annual meeting of the Michigan Association of Junior and Community colleges at Schoolcraft College on October 14 and 15.

The M.A.J.C.C. Legislative Assembly will meet at 3 p.m. on October 14, at the Mayflower Hotel in Plymouth. This meeting will be attended on Thursday, by administrative heads and faculty representatives of the member institutions.

On Friday, October 15, the administrators and faculty members will attend departmental and sectional meetings on the Schoolcraft College Campus.

These meetings, approximately 25 in number, will begin at 10 a.m. Following these meetings the Association will hold a luncheon meeting at Roma Hall.

The principal speaker at the luncheon will be Robert Theobald, who will address the conference on "Education and the Community College." Theobald is a British socio-economist who has been in the U.S. for several years.

He was born and raised in India, holds an M.A. degree from Cambridge, England, and did post-graduate work at Harvard. In 1957 he left the Organization for European Economic Cooperation, and worked on comparative productivity, in order to devote the bulk of his time to studying the effects of abundance on the scarcity-organized American socio-economy.

He now lives with his wife in New York City and divides his time between consulting, lecturing, speaking and writing on both sides of the Atlantic.

A group of 10 citizens flew in from Dayton, O., Saturday to tour the facilities of Schoolcraft College and to confer with administrators of the college.

Members of the group comprise a study committee which was chosen to represent the city of Dayton in developing plans for a community college in that city.

Dr. Raymond Young, of the University of Michigan, who arranged for the committee, to tour two new area colleges, joined the group for the Schoolcraft visit. The committee visited the Macomb County Community College Saturday afternoon.

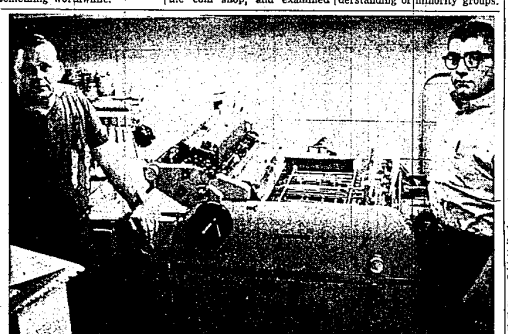
The classes will be held on Monday evenings from 7:30-9 p.m. and will be free to the public.

Featuring six racing lanes in a 75x42 foot area, and a 35x42 foot diving area, the pool has been under construction for nearly a year at the school, 1000 E. 10th St. south of Eight Mile Rd.

Clarenceville athletic director Lynn Nutter will serve as master of ceremonies for Sunday's dedication and water show.

The program will start with a water show of synchronized water ballet by members of the State Synchronized Swim Club of Thurston High School, who have been in several competitive

programs and are anxious to display their talents in this newest pool.

Members of the Thurston High School swimming team will display the excitement of competitive racing as they compete against one another.

Several divers will give the two one meter boards a workout as they show both clown and serious diving.

A highlight of the diving will be Clarenceville's own Chuck Thompson displaying some of the dives which made him an outstanding Michigan State University and Big Ten diver.

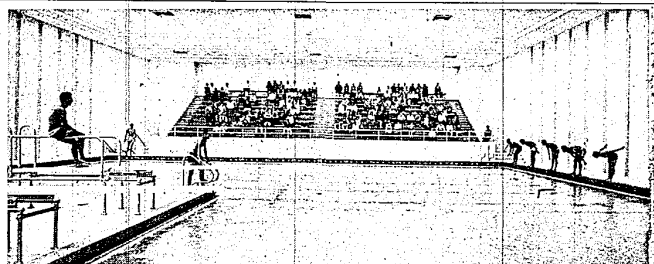
Following the watershow members of the Board of Education, school district's staff, and student body will express their thanks to the people of Clarenceville for the new facility.

Recreational swimming for the people of Clarenceville has received top priority in the scheduling of pool activities outside of the regular school hours.

Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday, and Sunday will offer available hours for community use. Only Tuesday night will classes use the pool as well as Saturday during the day. Class instruction will be for all ages and for a ten week

period will cost \$4 per person per course. Evening hours for recreational swimming will be from 7 to 9 p.m. during the week. Saturday hours will be 6 to 9 p.m. and Sunday will offer hours, 2 to 6 p.m. for family groups.

The classes will start on Tuesday, October 19 at 7 p.m. for adults and Saturday, Oct. 23, at 8 a.m. for youngsters.

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Stolen Coin Collection Recovered in Garden City

Detectives from the Farmington Township and Garden City Police departments arrested two Garden City youths on a charge of breaking and entering. According to the police, the pair had admitted taking a coin collection valued at \$15,000 from the home of Kurt Michel, 27441 Lakehill Drive, Farmington Township.

The youths are Patrick D. Dalton, 18, of 6520, Harrison, and Thomas Smith, 17, of 23467 Bridge.

According to the Police, the youths broke into Michel's home sometime between Sept. 28 and 30. The youths had 100 Canadian proof sets to a coin dealer in Garden City. (A proof set is a set of coins from off the mint, wrapped in transparent paper).

The dealer became suspicious, and contacted Garden City police.

Earlier, that department had received a teletype from the Farmington Township Police notifying it of the break-in at the Michel home.

Lt. Tom Shriver, and Chief of Detectives Russ Conway, of the Township Police, went to the coin shop, and examined

the coins. They were able to identify them as the stolen property.

Township and Garden City detectives staked out the homes of the suspects and arrested both when they appeared late at night.

Balloon Takes Long Journey From Livonia to Maryland

Across Lake Erie, over the Appalachian Mountains and beyond Chesapeake Bay floated a helium-filled balloon, released last week by a Livonia boy and found in Maryland by a five-year-old girl.

John Nowicki, 10, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roman Nowicki, of 3420 Elmwood, picked up a souvenir balloon from a Plymouth Road auto dealer on Friday, Oct. 1.

On the way home he released it after trying to it a slip of paper on which he had written his name and address, and the balloon floated skyward.

Last week, he received his letter back from Millington, Md. Five-year-old Sharon Barrett wrote him: "Dear John, I am a five-year-old girl. I found your balloon this morning (Oct. 21) bouncing around in my backyard. Mother and Dad told me it came a long way. It came across Chesapeake Bay to the east coast of Maryland."
