In 1964 the legislature lowered the local debt requirement from the 13 mills to seven mills in order to qualify for use of the Fund. It is under this new State law that Farmington finds it possible to lower its debt rate from 13 mills to seven mills per \$1,000 in order to free additional operational mills and still qualify for use of the Fund to meet interest and principal payments on outstanding and future bonds for building construction and site purchases.

The need for these four additional mills for operation is obvious.

Operating costs of schools, like all other businesses, have been rising from three to five per cent annually, statistics show.

The studentteacher operating cost also must be considered. Enrollment is increasing at a rate of about 1,000 students a year, creating additional costs. An estimated 17,300 children are expected by 1970.

To keep pace with growing enrollments, 31 additional teachers each year over the next five years will be required, Superintendent Gerald V. Harrison calculates.

In 1965 the estimated operation cost per student is \$470. By 1970 this is expected to rise about \$75 per child.

Also over the next five years, teachers' salaries are expected to rise from an estimated \$6,650 this year to \$7,400 in 1970.

As cost for building construction, operation and salaries climb, along with a rapid growth in the number of children to be educated, the four mill operational tax increase is the very minimum needed, Harrison believes.
