As the result of voters approving the \$6,100,000 bond issue they should eventually see a new elementary school, two elementary additions, an addition to Farmington Senior High, a third senior high school and additional school sites purchased.

According to Superintendent Gerald V. Harrison's prediction, this should handle building needs until 1970 if the school population continues to grow at a rate of 1,000 students a year.

The bond proposal forces faster growth at the junior and senior high levels, a reverse of previous trends.

Approval to extend the existing three mill operating tax for a ten-year period will continue to produce \$380,000 a year toward the total school needs of \$630,000. This money allows only for the present level of operation to be maintained.

Improvements and the ability to meet rising costs will come from the four mills which will be taken from debt retirement and put into the operation levy.

This exchange of funds from one budget envelope to another brings the amount paid for debt down to seven mills from the present 11 mills which the district is now paying. In turn the operation levy rises from 21.5 to 25.5 mills.

As a result, debt payment will be stretched out over a longer period of time, which financial experts say is sound as people who use the schools in years to come will take a share in paying for the buildings. This seven mills for debt is still above the average age five mills paid by other Michigan school districts.

Farmington residents will see this additional four operating mills work in improvements needed to keep pace with the annual three to five per cent rise in operating costs that businesses face. Added to this is the fact that the cost of \$470 per child for education is steadily rising.

A. G. Fleming Pleads Guilty in Shooting

Arthur C. Fleming Jr., 29, of 25068 Farmington Rd., Farmington Township, pleaded guilty to the charge of man-slaughter in the death by shooting of his brother-in-law George Henry, 33. He will be sentenced Dec. 7.

Fleming is alleged to have shot Henry at the Upper Straits Lake Resort Club in Commerce Township on Aug. 14. He says he shot his brother-in-law because the latter had propositioned his wife. He said at the time that he could not remember firing the shot.

If found guilty, he can be sentenced to 15 years. He had come to the Court of Circuit Judge Frederick C. Ziem charged with first degree murder.

Henry was shot in the chest with a 38 caliber revolver. He had been spending the summer at the resort with his wife and four children.

Contributes \$14,000 to UF

Residents in the Farmington area contributed a total of \$14,597 to the 1965 Torch Drive in the house-to-house canvass.

Small businesses contributed \$2,004. The total raised during the campaign was \$25,778, 441, or 117.8 per cent of the goal of \$21,892, 500.

The money raised in the tri-county campaign will go to finance the 1966 operation of 207 health and community welfare agencies. These include child care agencies, health research facilities, services for the aging, for the family, health and medical agencies, and youth character building agencies, which fill every human need.

In 17 successful campaigns, the United Foundation, which was the first in the country, has raised more than \$280 million for the voluntary support of health and welfare agencies.

No other united fund campaign in history has been so successful.
