In January the Michigan Wing screening will be held for all groups in the state. At this time the cadets will compete for overseas exchange, jet orientation and many other activities.

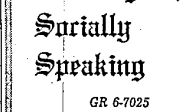
# Thieves Get \$4 in Nickels
