

# Rebounds Win for Falcons

The name of the game — in basketball — is rebounding. Just ask any expert. Nobody disagrees on this subject.

Farmington high enjoyed command of the boards last Friday night and the result was a 72-62 victory over Port Huron Central in the Farmington record to 2-1 for the season.

"We got 32 defensive rebounds," said Farmington coach Jack Quigley. "That figures out to one a minute and it sure made a difference."

Quigley, in particular, praised the rebounding of Center Mike Ames who nabbed 12 rebounds along with scoring 10 baskets and two free throws for 22 points, and Steve Moore, who hauled in 11 rebounds, although he was held to just seven points.

Farmington swarmed ahead, 21-15, after one quarter and held a 38-26 halftime command. By the end of the third period, the Falcons were rolling, 69-40, and the substitutes were getting their chance to play.

"I also liked the aggressiveness our team showed," said Quigley. "We didn't let up at any time."

Besides Ames, Farmington boasted two other scorers in double figures. Mike Wilson notched 10 baskets and one free throw for 21 points and Greg Dorow clipped in with six and two for 14.

George Habiet and Dan Miracle tallied three points each and Fred Simon two.

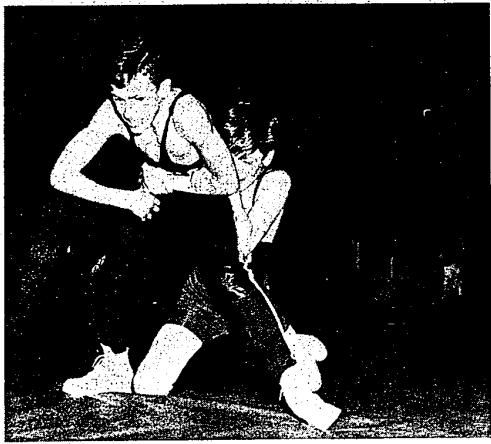

# Tigers List 45 Dates At Night

An increase in night games to a record total of 45 dates under the lights at Tiger Stadium in 1966 was announced Saturday by the Tigers.

Even the holiday action will go under the lights next season, according to the home schedule presented by James A. Campbell, executive vice-president and general manager.

"We are again increasing the number of night games because the fans tell us they want more games at night," he said. "I feel sure they will be pleased by the schedule for 1966."

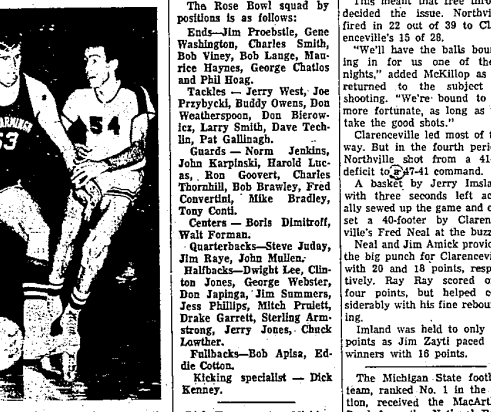
The Tigers will open their home season on Friday, April 15, against the Washington Senators and close on Sunday, Oct. 2, against the Kansas City Athletics. All of the action between those dates will be at night except for 11 Saturdays, 12 Sundays and four Thursdays.

The 45 night dates represent an increase of six from last season. When the Tigers installed their lights in 1964, they scheduled 14 night games a year until 1967, when it went to 21. It raised to 24 in 1968, 30 in 1969, and 39 in 1965.

The holiday nights for 1966, an innovation at Tiger Stadium, will be the Fourth of July, with a single game against the California Angels, and Labor Day, with a two-nighter against Washington. There are eight doubleheaders on the 1966 home schedule, five Sunday afternoons and three two-nighters. Saturday dates total 12, all afternoons except May 28, a night game with California.

The New York Yankees, always the No. 1 attraction at Tiger Stadium, are scheduled for six night games, one Sunday afternoon game, one Saturday afternoon game. The American League champion Minnesota Twins have drawn five night games, one Sunday doubleheader and two other afternoon games on Thursday and Saturday.

Starting his 19th season as coach, Newt Loken faces a rebuilding problem after having lost the finest trampoline team in Wolverine history in John Hamilton, Fred Sanders and Gary Ervin. This trio completely dominated the Big Ten for three years and took the three top spots in the NCAA last year.

Loss of these three athletes plus that of Mike Henderson, national floor exercise champion and Alex Frieska, top all-around scorer, pose a real replacement problem for Loken.

Three seniors return, including Capt. Ned Duke, all-around performer; John Cashman, high bar and Rich Johnston on rings and parallel bars. Returning juniors include Gary VanderVoort, all-around; Cliff Childers, rings and high bar; Dick Stone, rings; Phil and Chip Fuller, floor exercise, among others.

The sophomore contingent contains several promising campbellites. These include Wayne Miller, Lafayette, La., NAU champion; Steve Davis, Charleston, W. Va., and Don Conant, Evanston, Ill., both state titlists and Keith Cooley of Detroit.

Side horse performers include Larry Quinn, Morton Grove, Ill.; Dave Geddes, Floral Park, N.Y., and Larry Merrick, Lincolnwood, Ill. # Rec. Dept. Joins New Nat'l. Group

M. Lee O'Connor, chairman of the Livonia Parks and Recreation Commission, today announced the formation of the National Recreation and Park Association. This non-profit educational and service organization was formed by the joining of five national agencies concerned with recreation, parks and conservation.

The groups merging to form the NRPA are: The American Association of Zoological Parks and Aquariums, the American Institute of Park Executives, the American Recreation Society, the National Conference on State Parks and the National Recreation Association.

O'Connor noted the aim of the merger was to develop a single organization supported by private citizens and professional groups and dedicated to helping all Americans make the best and most satisfying use of their expanding free time.

He pointed out that the Livonia Parks and Recreation Department was an affiliate of the National Recreation Association and that it will continue to be affiliated with the new NRPA.

Mr. Laurence S. Rockefeller has been elected the president of the NRPA. Mr. Rockefeller served as chairman and coordinator of the White House Conference on Natural Beauty held in May of this year and is chairman of the New York City Council of Parks.

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
