CARE Seeks Funds for Holiday Food Crusade

The 1965 holiday-season CARE Food Crusade opened today with a goal of sending six million packages to the hungry overseas as personal gifts from Americans who give a dollar per package.

Combined with CARE Partnership Programs whereby host governments pay most of the distribution costs, the packages will complete a year-long plan to help feed more than 37,000,000 people in 34 countries, it was announced by Frank L. Goffe, executive director.

Largest single item in the \$600,000 fund appeal is a \$500,000 allocation to buy rice, salt and mace (a high-protein fish sauce) for civilian war victims in South Vietnam.

However, U.S. Food for Peace donations of farm abundance are the mainstay of CARE's Partnership Programs which bring these foods to almost 90% of the recipients. Food Crusade packages of farm commodities, special purchases or products donated by private firms are needed to cover the balance.

29 Student Teachers Practice in S. Redford

One of the toughest college courses they ever will experience, would-be teachers agree, is their field work when they function as student teachers in the public schools and learn directly from an employed critic teacher and, most of all, from students.

A total of 29 students in education are now full-fledged associate teachers (this is the new "educational" term for student teachers) in many grades and subject levels in South Redford Schools from the following colleges and universities: Madonna, Michigan State, Eastern Wayne State, University of Detroit, Mercy.

The new instructors are under the direction of the curriculum office, headed by Dr. James Lehman, S. Redford assistant superintendent, and college representatives. Conferences with supervising teachers and seminars with administrators and college experts are the academic part of what otherwise is student centered effort in the teaching situation.

"Under present conditions of keen competition to obtain first quality teachers in southeastern Michigan, we find that our program for associate teaching gives the district a selection of teachers from colleges and universities," Supl. M. D. Roe asserted.
