

Livonia Peace Corpsman Leaves Jan. 3 for Kenya

Robert Yost, son of Mrs. Lillian M. Yost, of 1804 Riverside Drive, Livonia, has been named a Peace Corps volunteer, having completed 12 weeks of training at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. The new Volunteers will leave for Kenya on January 3.

They will work for the Ministry of Agriculture of Kenya as extension workers assisting in irrigation schemes and in the operation of large scale farms.

Kenya, a former British colony and protectorate, gained independence in 1963. The first group of Peace Corps Volunteers arrived there approximately

metely a year ago. This new group brings to 220 members of Volunteers at work there as teachers, agricultural workers and rural community development.

During training the Volunteers studied Swahili, the language of East Africa, African culture and history, United States history and world affairs. They also received special instruction in farm management.

The departing Volunteers join the 10,000 other Peace Corps Volunteers now working in 46 nations of Asia, Africa and Lat-

Farmington Represented at Leadership Conference

Farmington was represented at a leadership conference sponsored by the Oakland County Human Relations Coordinating Council.

Those attending from Farmington were: John Millhorne, The Rev. James O'Hagan and Robert Liddell.

They heard Burton I. Gordin, executive director of the Michigan Civil Rights Commission, tell them that "In all white suburbs where many, if not most of you here today live, I know you are faced with general apathy because of the people say, 'We don't have any problems here.' This merely means 'We don't have any Negro Citizens here.'"

"If that's not a problem for your unconcerned neighbors, you can be assured that it's a serious problem for Negro citizens who seek to move into and live peacefully in your community."

Gordin said local councils "can set the climate of welcome and openness in a community."

"You can do this through informational and educational programs which involve the committed and uncommitted community leaders, including public officials, the clergy, educators, businessmen and labor leaders."

A second role for local councils, Gordin said, was as a vehicle for social action.

"What I am talking about," he stated, "is a process of organization, communication and action. It means getting the facts, analyzing the facts, making the facts known, arousing people's interest and mobilizing support for your position."

Marriage in College Has Little Effect On Future Finances

EAST LANSING — Getting married in college may put a financial burden on both partners while they are still students, but it seems to have little long-term economical effect.

A recent study by Dr. Frances Magrabi and Marcia P. King of Michigan State University's College of Home Economics showed very little difference between married and unmarried students in terms of economic well-being up to seven years after leaving MSU.

"In fact," the study notes, "the married students tended to have slightly higher incomes but smaller liquid assets."
