Diane Carruthers Bowls To 7th Place National Finish

Farmington's State Bowling Champion Diane Carruthers, 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Allan S. Carruthers of 31561 Rockcrest Drive in Farmington, narrowly missed capturing the finals of the Fifth Annual National Youth Bowling Championships held July 28, 29 and 30 in Washington, D.C. After two days of bowling, competition with the top junior bowlers in the nation, Diane

was in seventh place, just one place short of qualifying for the finals.

A RIPPED FINGER nail kept Diane from hitting her average of 149 in her last game on Thursday. A disappointed Diane sat on the sidelines with her mother who accompanied her on the trip Friday as the six finalists battled for the National Championship. Diane, who was graduated in June from Farmington High School, bettered some twenty other junior girls in the National Tourney, sponsored by the Bowling Proprietors Association of America. She was in fourth place in a field of 27 girls. She missed the finals by 13 pins.

DIANE HAS BEEN bowling for five years and has had single games of 225 and series in the 300's on many occasions. Next year she will defend her State Championship Title which she earned in June. A banquet planned August 22 in Detroit's Latin Quarter for the State Youth Bowling Champions is the time Diane will receive her trophy award.

While in the nation's capital, Diane toured the White House and other places of interest, met Congressman Bill S. Farnum who arranged a break fast meeting for her and her mother, and also met some of the nation's top professional bowlers.

In a practice game, Diane beat Women's National Champion Ann Slatery with a 198 game. She also met National Men's Champion Dick Webster. A chartered bus was provided for the junior bowlers who hailed from 28 states for the tour of the capital city.
