Orchard Meth. Youth on Bus Tour of the East
Orchard Methodist Church was privileged to send two of their young people to the Methodist Bus Caravan of 1962 from July 11-23.
Bob Carly and Nancy Naudman traveled with 70 other youth and their counselors on this 13th annual trip which shows the church at work in colleges, churches, and related agencies.
THE TOUR this year covered parts of eight states in the East and part of one province of Canada.
After a day touring Detroit's inner-city Methodist affiliations, they went to Niagara Falls, Boston, Connecticut, spent four nights in the New York area, Philadelphia, a two-day stay in Washington, D.C., and a tour of the Gettysburg battle grounds.
This 13-day trip included a day at the World's Fair, at the U.N. Buildings, Radio City Music Hall, visiting historic and famous architectural churches and colleges, Arlington Cemetery, and a special tour of the White House.
THESE YOUNG people stayed overnight in Methodist Churches along the way using sleeping bags.
The Detroit Conference Youth Council of the Board of Christian Education; the Board of Missions; and the Woman's Society of Christian Service sponsored this annual trip.
Those chosen to participate are young people who have a genuine interest in the church and are active in the Methodist Youth Fellowship.

Stephen Droegge Now A Deacon
St. James' Episcopal Church, on West Outer Drive, was recently the scene of one of Christianity's most highly regarded institutions as the Rt. Rev. Archie H. Crowley, Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Michigan, ordained Stephen Droegge of Farmington to the sacred order of Deacons.
The service, conducted before an overflow congregation followed a tradition dating back as far as New Testament times where the three-fold order of ministry is Biblically described.
Following the majestic procession of more than forty participants in the service, visiting clergy, and choir, The Rev. William F. Church, Rector of the Cathedral Church of St. Paul, read the Preface to the Ordinal, which states the requirements necessary before a man be admitted to the office of Deacon.
THE SERMON, given by the Rev. Ralph W. Parks, Jr., Rector of All Saints Episcopal Church, Detroit, related the importance and function of the office of Deacon to the Church.
The actual ordination of the Rev. Stephen Droegge, 35, a chemical technician for the Ethel Corporation of Detroit, took place during the Sacrament of Holy Communion. The candidate was presented by the Rev. Garfield N. Brown, Rector, St. James' Detroit, and was invested - robed in

Sealed bids for the purchase of 1965 Sewer Special Assessment Bonds Series I to be issued by the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, of the par value of \$300,000.00 will be received by the undersigned, at the Township Hall, 31555 Eleven Mile Road, (Post Office, Farmington, Michigan), in said Township, until 8:00 o'clock P.M., Eastern Standard Time, on Thursday, the 12th day of August, 1965, at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened and read.
Said bonds will be dated March 1, 1965, will be coupon bonds, the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, will be numbered consecutively in the direct order of their maturities from 1 upwards, and will bear interest from their date at a rate or rates not exceeding 5 per cent per annum, payable on August 1, 1965, and thereafter semi-annually on each February 1 and August 1. Each bid shall state the annual interest rate or rates upon which it is submitted, expressed in multiples of 1/8 of 1 per cent. The interest rate for each coupon period of any one bond shall be at one rate only and shall not be represented by one coupon only and all bonds maturing in the same year must be delivered with the same rate of delivery of such bonds must be paid by the purchaser at the time of delivery. Both principal and interest will be payable at such bank or trust company as may be designated by the original purchaser of the bonds, which paying agent

qualifies as such under the Statutes of the State of Michigan or of the Federal Government.
The said bonds will mature serially in the amount of \$6,000.00 on August 1 in the year 1965, and \$21,000.00 on August 1 in each of the years 1966 through 1979. Bonds maturing in the years 1974 through 1979 are subject to redemption at the option of the township, in direct numerical order, of such notice of interest payment dates on and after August 1, 1970, at a par value thereof and accrued interest. Notice of redemption shall be given to the holders of bonds called for redemption by publication of such notice of interest payment dates in a newspaper or publication circulated in the City of Detroit, Michigan, which carries as a part of its regular service, notices of the sale of municipal bonds. Bonds so called for redemption shall not bear interest after the date fixed for redemption, provided funds are on hand with the paying agent at the time of delivery. The said bonds are to be issued in anticipation of the collection of an equal amount of installments of special assessments against lands in certain special assessment districts, to defray the cost of constructing sewers in said township, and in addition will pledge the full faith and credit of the township for the payment of the principal and interest thereon.
For the purpose of awarding the bonds, the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining, at the rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of all interest on the bonds from September 1, 1965 to the respective maturities and deducting therefrom any premium. The bonds

will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above computation produces the lowest interest cost to the township. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the bonds or at a price less than their par value will be considered.
A certified or cashier's check in the amount of \$6,000.00 drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Township Treasurer must accompany each bid. The bidder must also furnish on the part of the bidder, to be forfeited as liquidated damages if such bid is rejected and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the bonds. No interest shall be allowed on the good faith checks and checks of the unsuccessful bidders will be promptly returned to each bidder. Bids shall be opened by the Township Treasurer or by registered bank or trust company. Payment of said bonds shall be made in Federal Reserve Funds.
Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified opinion of Dickinson, Wright, McKean & Cudlip, Attorneys, Detroit, Michigan, approving the legality of the bonds. The cost of said bonds and interest on the printing of the bonds will be paid by the township. There will also be furnished the usual closing papers, including a non-litigation certificate, dated as of the date of the delivery of the bonds. Bonds will be delivered at Detroit, Michigan, or such other place as may be agreed upon between the township and the purchaser.
The right is reserved to reject any or all bids.
