## New Junior Football League Is Formed

Adult groups of "too much travel" have been removed from little league football this fall in Garden City, Nankin, Livonia and Farmington. These communities have withdrawn off from the far flung All American Football Leagues to operate as a nine-member Western Suburban Junior Football League for the 8-12 brand of fall athlete.

Travel was the principal reason given by officials of the new league for withdrawing to form a "neighborly" conference. The All American last fall operated with 17 member communities, reaching from Clear River on the south to St. Clair Shores on the northeast and as far west as Nankin and Livonia.

**ASFA RESULT**, Nankin, Livonia and Garden City withdrew to form the nucleus of the new league, and "sold" Farmington on entering a new franchise, called the "Missiles." Farmington High School field will serve as "home" for the new team.

The schedule for the Farmington Missiles is: Livonia Blue Jays, Sept. 19; Garden City Hornets, Sept. 26; Livonia Cardinals, Oct. 3; Nankin Hawks, Oct. 17; Nankin Jets, Oct. 24; Livonia Falcons, Oct. 31; and Livonia Eagles, Nov. 7.

Garden City also has a single member representative in the new league. The Garden City Hornets will call the Le-City field their home base.

Nankin has two entrants, the Rockets and the Jets, who share Nankin Junior High as their home park. The two Nankin clubs are scheduled to meet on the final day of the season, November 7.
