Mr. Frank J. Van Loon of 30410 Springland in Farmington died September 21 in Providence Hospital at the age of 53.

Mr. Van Loon was born January 29, 1912, in Michigan, the son of Henry J. and Sophie Karver Van Loon. He was united in marriage to his wife, Dorothy, who survives him, in 1942.

MR. VAN LOON attended University of Detroit High School and was graduated in 1934 from the University of Detroit. He served two years as a Lieutenant with the U.S. Navy during World War II.

Funeral services were held September 23 from the Our Lady of Sorrows Church in Farmington where he was a member.

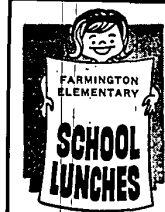

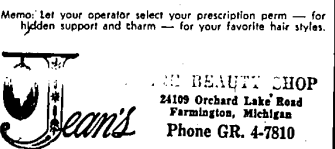
