The Board of Education has been continuing its study of various plans for increased facilities to provide for the additional pupils who will be attending the various Clarenceville Schools. It is the anticipation of the Board of Education that approximately 650 additional pupils will be enrolling in the next two years.

Certain construction is now underway at the Edgewood Elementary School and the Junior High School to meet the urgent needs which will develop as a result of this anticipated increase. Construction will begin in the near future at the High School.

During the past several years Clarenceville has had approximately 385 youngsters enrolled in kindergarten and approximately 114 pupils graduated from high school in June of 1965. Projections for the future indicate that the number enrolling in kindergarten will be approximately 425 annually.

The financial position of the school district is sound. Of recent date the Municipal Finance Commission authorized the Board of Education transferring monies from the 1952 and 1954 Debt Fund, which obligations have been paid. The transfers were made to the 1956 Debt Fund. The 1965 Debt was authorized by the electorate on March 23, 1965 when additional bonding in the amount of \$1,500,000.00 was approved. On March 29, 1965 the electorate authorized four additional mills for operation.

The Board of Education and the staff of Clarenceville School District must continue to study and consider the findings of research and evaluate existing programs in order to continue to provide the greatest possible educational opportunities for children. Our changing society makes it imperative that we endeavor to develop a type of program that the electorate of the district can and will support for its children.

Findings of studies and reevaluation of the high school curriculum resulted in increased subject offerings in many areas in 1964-65 such as science, mathematics, social studies, industrial arts, and commercial. The increased requirements for graduation and lengthened class periods made it necessary that pupils spend more time in classroom activities. One of the major changes in the elementary field for the 1965-66 year will be in the field of social studies, especially in grades kindergarten through four.

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
