### Last Minute Voter Signup In Twp. Heavy Electric Code


A heavy last minute sign up of new voters wishing to be on the Farmington Township election rolls to qualify to vote in the November elections was reported this week by the township clerk's office.

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project by letter and it was placed on file by the nine-member commission.

CHAIRMAN FRED Siebert stated the arguments of the City Planners in favor of the rezoning, W. Allen Nelson, Arthur D. Millard, Councilman Pete Peterson, Mrs. Doris Fortner, and Richard Duncan, when he stated "after having weighed the obvious benefits which would accrue to the community with the development of such a project and the alternative uses of the land as well as the effect the project would have on surrounding property it is my opinion that we cannot do otherwise than recommend to the Council the rezoning be approved."

SIEBERT'S REFERENCE to the "alternative uses" of the property clearly hint at the proposals made last month during

a public hearing before the Planning Commission when residents spoke of creating a park in the area rather than "build apartments on stills." Buildings raised on cement columns are virtually the only type that could ever gain acceptance for present City zoning for the flood plain area although single family homes were built in Twin Valley Subdivision prior to the advent of flood plain zoning controls. One already existing park immediately to the west of the proposed apartment house project site persuaded planners from recommending the City purchase the land for a park extension in view of the fact no parks whatever exist south of Grand River to serve residents and park sites should be balanced to accommodate the recreational needs of the entire community.

PRIOR TO PASSING their recommendation to approve rezoning of the land, planners detailed two revisions made in the plans of developers. One of the revisions increased the size of the entrance way to the proposed apartments on Grand Avenue to a boulevard type which would eliminate the necessity for an emergency egress to the north. The second revision reduced the number of units planned in the development from the original 106 to 91 which would allow for better setbacks and a nature trail through the area.

The City Planning Commission and the City's firm of consulting engineers both must give site plan approval to the apartment house project with final approval needed from the United Methodist Church, a favorable rezoning action is taken.

### Pair Arrested In Coin Theft by Twp. Police

The Farmington Township Police Department's Detective Bureau this week climaxed ten days of investigation into the theft of a \$15,000 coin collection from the home of Kurt Michel of 27441 Lakehill Drive. Two suspects arrested last week were charged with the theft.

### Studying Lighting At I-696, Orchard

The need for better lighting at the entrance ramps to the I-696 Expressway off Orchard Lake Road was called for by Trustee Earl Oppenauer at the regular Township Board meeting Monday night.

It was his feeling that an effort should be made to get this overhead lighting even if the township had to pay for the safety improvement.

Supervisor Curt Hall agreed to discuss the matter in detail with the Orchard County Road Commission. There is some question as to where approval would have to come from since this is part of a federal and state highway system.

Hall expressed some misgivings about the township offering to pay for the lights if they were installed.

### Receiving Bids For College In Township

Bids were taken this Tuesday on the first phase of construction on the Orchard Ridge Campus site in Farmington Township by officials of the Oakland Community College District.

Original plans had called for at least some of the buildings on this local campus site to be ready for the start of college classes here in the fall of 1966. It has now been reported that the buildings will not be ready in time to permit the scheduling of any classes until the fall of 1967.

### Forest Hills Church To Show Timely Films

"Anything Can Happen" is the title of a new 40-minute motion picture scheduled for public showing at Forest Hills United Methodist Church, 30622 W. 12 Mile Rd. on October 16, at 8 p.m.

Produced by the National Association of Evangelicals, the film is a candid probe into the attitudes and actions of Christians in today's churches. Characterized by some as startling, this new black and white documentary uses on-the-spot interviews in a concerned examination of church membership.

The film contrasts the comfortable climate inside the church with the restless search that goes on constantly outside its four walls for something that can satisfy.

"We must be enlisted in finding God's ways for the 20th century," says W.A.E. general director, Dr. Clyde W. Taylor, who appears in the film.

"World's Fair Encounter," another film, is based on the story of two young people who visited the Fair and will be shown at Forest Hills Church on October 17, at 7 p.m.

The meeting of the two young people and their growing friendship during a day at the Fair is the vehicle through which viewers are entertained, informed and inspired. They visit many of the exhibits and the story climaxes take place in the Billy Graham Pavilion where the widest motion picture, "Man in the 5th Dimension," makes its impact on the film's principals.

The young couple's impressions of the unusual church presentation become a symbol of the actual response by thousands who have found spiritual meaning and purpose in life amid the glitter and excitement of the New York World's Fair.

### Master Plan Meet Thursday

The Farmington Township Board and Township Planning Board will be meeting this Thursday evening, Oct. 14, with state planning officials for a complete review of a planned extensive study and revision of the township's present master plan.

This is the final phase of study in determining whether the township can qualify for Federal assistance to carry out its proposed extensive master plan study. Approval will mean that two-thirds of the cost for this study will be provided by the Federal government through the state's community planning agency.

land Avenue, although not plotted as a through street under the City Master Plan, would draw through traffic to the downtown area from the area to the west of Woodcroft to the City Master Plan. At a meeting held this Monday night, City planners agreed to take steps to prevent through traffic by vacating Oakland Avenue west of Woodcroft so that Drake Road would become the logical route in and out of streets in the new sub.

A SECOND MEETING on the City's annexation plans will be staged Thursday night, October 18, at 8 p.m. in the Municipal Building for the purpose of confirming sewer and water installation cost by official action of the City Council and any questions pertaining to financing and installation costs will be covered.

Fred Siebert, Chairman of the City Planning Commission, indicated that residents still having questions on the proposed development of the area under the City's Master Plan would still be able to obtain information in that regard at the meeting next Thursday night.

Dinan also pointed out that "The Master Plan for the area was designed to give well-balanced economic potential, utilizing Grand River Avenue and Expressway 2480 frontage, for office and industrial use but being so located to be compatible with residential development in the area."

A TEN-ACRE PARCEL of land adjacent to the west boundary of the Longacre School is proposed to be developed as a park with plans calling for an access route to the school along the northern boundary of the ten-acre park. This route, it was emphasized, would not be designed for through traffic but would serve only school needs and residents using the park.

As was pointed out by Richard Gaul of Woodcroft Subdivision, another access route to the Longacre School would be desirable in order to reduce school bus traffic on subdivision streets in Woodcroft. With the development of a new access route to the school from the west, through the proposed park, school buses would be able to travel main roads and eliminate the necessity for going through Woodcroft Subdivision.
