College Campus First Presbyterian Church Tour Slated By YWCA Plans Unique Seminar Series

Senior high school girls who wish to visit and learn about five Michigan colleges are invited to join a college campus tour sponsored by Downtown Branch YWCA Oct. 29 and 30. The girls will meet at the Downtown YW, 2230 Witherell St., at 8 a.m. Friday, Oct. 29, to board a chartered bus for the trip. They will return by 6 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 30.

They will visit Michigan State University in East Lansing; Central Michigan University in Mt. Pleasant; and Western Michigan College, Kalamazoo College and Nazareth College in Kalamazoo. Tours of each institution will be conducted by students attending the college.

They will be lodged overnight at the Harris Motor Inn in Kalamazoo. Reservations for the tour are limited and must be made by Oct. 19 at the Teenage Department of the Downtown YWCA. Cost of the trip is \$15.00 which includes transportation and overnight accommodation but no meals.

A pre-trip meeting to discuss details of the tour will be held at the Downtown YW Monday, Oct. 25, at 4:30 p.m. All taking the tour must attend this meeting, and parents are invited.

The girls will be accompanied by Mrs. Arnold Van Zanten, YWCA teenage program director.

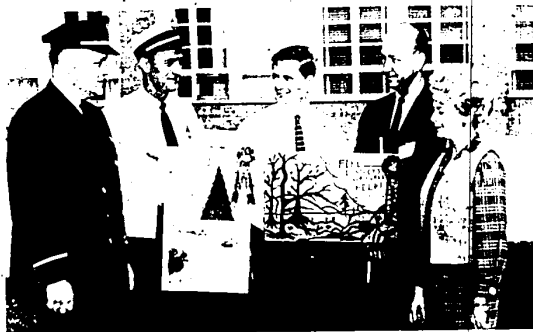
viding training and consultation in family counseling for the clergy of Oakland County. This advanced work has included some 250 priests, pastors and rabbis during its first year.

DR. RIEWALD is a certified psychologist with his Doctorate from Michigan State University, also served as a student counselor. He has additional postdoctoral training in psychotherapy and marriage counseling. He's a member of the training staff in psychotherapy and marriage counseling at Merrill-Palmer Institute, Detroit.

The First Presbyterian program will start with a discussion on Oct. 17 led by Dr. Riewald on "growing self in spite of marriage." On Oct. 24, Dr. William Nichols of the Merrill-Palmer Inst. will discuss "growing marriage relationships."

On Nov. 7, Dr. Paul Doering, also of Merrill-Palmer Inst., will speak on the relationship of children and parents. Dr. Doering is widely recognized for his work as a child psychologist.

The final session on Nov. 14 by Dr. Riewald will discuss the very vital topic of "living with our teenagers." Those wishing to register for the series can do so by phoning the church office.
