

Deadline For St. Scholarships Is October 31

State Representative Raymond L. Baker (64th District) is alerting high school seniors in his district that the deadline for registration to be eligible for a state college scholarship is October 31.

Baker said, "Unfortunately every year these deadlines go by and students who might qualify miss out. There are almost 8,000 scholarships available for the next academic year, 1966-67, and I want to make sure all high school seniors have a chance to apply."

"To apply," Baker said, "students should:

(1) Obtain a State of Michigan Competitive Scholarship registration form from their high schools.

(2) Mail self-addressed envelope, the registration form and a \$1.50 fee by October 31, 1965 according to the registration instructions; and

(3) Take the State Competitive Scholarship examination at 8 a.m., Saturday, November 20, at the assigned center."

Baker indicated that high school offices usually have all the necessary details available, but that in case they do not, interested students should write to the Michigan Higher Education Assistance Authority, 700 Prudden Building, Lansing, Michigan.

He is a graduate of North Farmington High School and plans to major in history.

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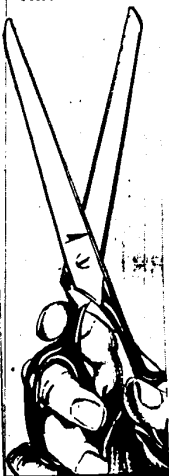
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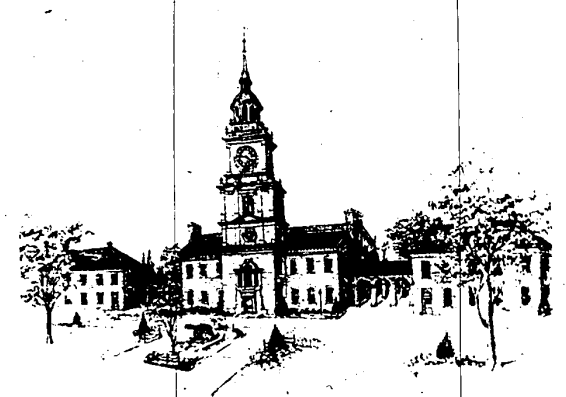
