

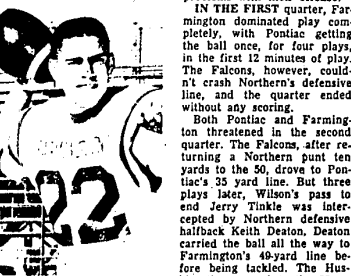
Falcon Gridders Blank Pontiac Northern, 8-0

LED BY A STONE wall defense, the Falcons defeated Pontiac Northern High last Friday by a score of 8-0. Only once during the entire game did Northern push beyond the Farmington 30 yard line—this coming with only seven seconds left in the first half.

Pontiac, however, almost broke the game wide open in the opening series of downs. Quarterback Bill Wilson fumbled the ball attempting to pass on third down from Farmington's 35 yard line. Nick Loukas, Pontiac tackle, picked up the loose ball and breezed his way to the 15, where he was tackled—and also fumbled! Farmington recovered the ball, and began all over again, this time with a first down.

Although it rained continually throughout most of the encounter, it was Falcon passing which accounted for their only touchdown. After mixing three completions with a well balanced running attack, quarterback Mike Wilson fired the ball to senior end Dan Klavender. Klavender barreled four more yards through the Northern secondary, and into the end zone for the score.

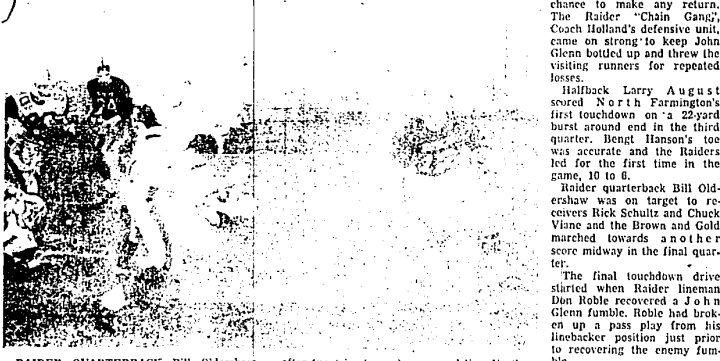
Raider Gridders Win 4th Straight; Beat Undeclared John Glenn, 17-6
