Falcons Prepare for Finale With Unbeaten Raiders

Cross-town football rivalry explodes again this Saturday as Farmington Senior High plays host to North Farmington High School.

The Falcons of Farmington venture forth into the November 13 encounter with a 3-5 record. The squad has lost its last three games, to Wallied Lake, Roseville, and Southfield, respectively. Farmington has not won a game since October 17, when the gridders upset highly-ranked East Detroit by a score of 21-7.

North Farmington, however, carries a perfect unbeaten and untied record into the game. In their match last Saturday, the Raiders racked East Side Champion Denby High 23-13 for their eighth straight win. "It was the best game I've ever seen them play," commented Richard Tyler, Farmington's head coach. "Their great depth showed throughout the game — their second string backs did an excellent job."

"North Farmington has a very versatile team," Tyler added. "They have a large variety of plays, and a very good defensive unit."

For the second time in as many weeks, one driving option runner proved to be the base for the Falcon downfall. Bluejay halfback Ted Simmons carried 35 times for the victors and gained 203 yards rushing as the football squad from Farmington was beaten

22-6 by Southfield. Farmington led in the game until the midpoint of the third quarter. Following a personal foul penalty against the Bluejays which moved the ball to the five yard line—quarterback Mike Wilson lofted a short pass to Falcon Wayne Johnston, who dove into the end zone for the score. Farmington took this six point lead with a scant five seconds left in the first period. The first scoring drive of the game, which began on the Falcons' own 12 yard line, encompassed a total of 16 Farmington plays.

Then, with 58 seconds remaining in the first half, Southfield began the scoring attack which they continued for the rest of the game. After the Bluejays had lost the ball to Farmington on the six yard line to a stall-war Falcon defensive line, Southfield pushed the Falcons back to the three. Ron Shortt, on the next play, was trapped in his own end zone for a two point safety for Southfield. At the end of the first half, the score read Farmington 6, Southfield 2.
