## Farmington Recruit

### In Navy Boot Camp

Seaman Recruit Timothy J. Boyer, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Marion J. Boyer of 28520 Kirkside Lane in Farmington, has begun seven weeks of Navy basic training at the U.S. Naval Training Center, San Diego, Calif.

In the first weeks of his naval service he will study military subjects and live and work under conditions similar to those he will encounter on his first ship or at his first shore station. In making the transition from civilian to sailor he will be taught and supervised by experienced Navy petty officers. They will teach him the basic skills of seamanship as well as survival techniques, military drill and other basic subjects.

On completion of his recruit training he will be assigned to a school, shore station or ship, according to the results of his Navy classification tests, his own desires and the needs of the Navy.

## New Multiple Zoning Official

The Township Board gave a one hundred per cent endorsement November 8 to the recommendations of its Planning Commission on ordinance changes regarding multiple housing zoning. The Township Board's vote action makes the changes official. Zoning for all multiple housing development is now broken down into three classifications.

With regard to apartment units, the lowest classification allows 14 apartment units per acre, the middle classification 10 units per acre and the highest classification 7 units per acre. Most areas zoned or to be rezoned in the future for apartments will very likely be in the Middle or 10 units per acre classification, Township Attorney Terry Brennan indicated.
