

Raiders Post Perfect 9-0 Season, Down Falcons 14-0, Season Finale

North Farmington High School closed its finest gridiron campaign with a 14-0 victory over neighborhood rival Farmington High in the Second Annual Old Yule Log Benefit Game, played Saturday on the Clarence Bell Field at FHS.

It wrapped up a perfect 9-0 season for the Raiders of North Farmington, their first undefeated and untied season in football.

The final victory Saturday didn't come easy for the Raiders as they battled a determined Farmington High team. The Falcons were out to try and make up for a disappointing season of three wins against five losses and were upset minded all the way.

CRAIG WYCKINSKY, Raider fullback, proved too much for Farmington as he averaged nearly five yards per carry while rolling to 55 of the total 177 yards netted on the ground by North Farmington.

Wyckinsky had considerable help from halfback Larry August who turned in one of his finest games of the season with a 31-yard touchdown run, the longest of the afternoon, and

turned in a total of 60 yards rushing in 11 carries. His longest drive was less than two minutes remaining in the first half and capped the scoring for the Raiders.

QUARTERBACK Bill Oldershaw marched the Raiders down the field for their first score after they received the opening kickoff off from Farmington. The drive covered 84 yards and took 12 plays with Oldershaw covering the final three yards to pay dirt. Swede Bengt Hansen converted the first of his two extra points and North Farmington had a 7-0 lead with less than seven minutes gone in the first quarter.

Farmington stormed right back when they got their hands on the football and put together a drive of 14 plays which carried them from their own 25 yard line to the Raiders' 13 where the ball went over on downs as fullback Wayne Johnston missed on a fourth-and-three situation of picking up another series for the Falcons.

The Falcons held the edge in statistics at the game's end but threatened the Raiders on only one other occasion when Johnston was stopped by inches of picking up a first down on the Raider six yard line in the final period. That drive started when Farmington recovered a Raider fumble on North's 36 yard line.

A 31-yard pass from Wilson to Falcon and Dan Klavender was the longest completion of the afternoon and it came in the fourth quarter drive that stalled on the Raider six yard line.

THE PASSING ARM of Wilson accounted for much of the yardage in Farmington's opening drive as he hit halfback Ron Shortt on two aerials good for 27 yards and seven yards with the second loss penetrating to the Raider 11 yard line.

North Farmington opened the second half with its only other scoring threat of the game with a drive from their own 25 yard line to the Farmington 13 yard stripe where Bengt Hansen's attempted field goal fell short.

Oldershaw directed the 31-yard drive in 13 plays and hit Larry August on an 11-yard pass play to put it in motion. The only other times Oldershaw took to the air were minutes later at the end of the third quarter and August and Wyckinsky, and the Raider quarterback, himself, had maneuvered the ball to the Farmington 10 yard line on rushes. Both of those passes attempted fell incomplete setting the stage for the field-goal try by Hansen.

COACH HOLLAND has good reason to be proud of his 1965 Raider team which assured itself at least a tie for the North Farmington Suburban Conference Championship when it defeated Thurston, 17-14, four Saturdays ago but "stayed up" to clinch the title with a 13-0 victory over the unbeaten Denby Tars, Detroit City Champions, 23 to 13, the Saturday before en route to the Falcons of Farmington in the season's gridiron finale.

The Raiders scored a total of 192 points to their opponents' 66 through the nine-game schedule this fall. Clarenceville bowed 39 to 6 in the most lopsided score. Kettering stumbled 27 to 12, and the best Franklin, John Glenn and Groves could manage were seven points each as the Raiders ran up scores of 27, 14 and 32 points, respectively, in those opening league battles.

Farmington under first-year mentor Dick Tyler has its finest moment in a solid 21 to 7 upset victory over a third-ranked East Detroit which came to town unbeaten and unscored upon and turned out to be the third and final gridiron victims of the Falcons in the 1965 season. Farmington gave up decisions to Bentley (29-6), Waterford (7-0), Roseville (31-14), Southfield (22-6) and Walled Lake (20-13) while taking victories from Plymouth, 14 to 2, and Pontiac Northern, 8 to 0, prior to the win over East Detroit.

Gridiron High Set by Gunners

On Sunday, November 7, the Our Lady of Sorrows Grade School Gunners ended one of their best football seasons in recent years with a 27-7 victory over Our Lady of Refuge of Orchard Lake to capture the Suburban League Championship.

Posting a 5-0-2 league record, and a 7-0-2 overall record, the Gunners were one of the strongest teams in recent C.Y.O. football history.

THE GUNNERS averaged over 300 yards on the ground per game. Leading the Gunner attack this year were halfbacks Mike Page and Art Devine, fullback Bob Bateman, and quarterback Ross Patton, and end Bill McDevitt.

The defensive unit, which allowed an average of only five points per game, was headed by Barry Walsh, Ross and Randy Bergeron, Steve Theisen, Chuck Lasky and Pat Kern.

The Gunners' coaching staff was headed by Mike McCloskey with Andy Louinger and St. A Secosy assistants.

Three Farmington High School football players were selected to the Inter Lakes League All-Conference Team and a fourth tied in the balloting but because the other player's team finished higher in the standings settled for Honorable Mention with five other Falcons.

Named to the All-Conference first team were Junior end Jerry Tinkle and seniors Wayne Johnston at fullback and Ron Shortt at halfback.

Falcon quarterback Mike Wilson tied in the first team balloting with Terry Lehman of the Championship Walled Lake Vikings and so received Honorable Mention along with Falcon linemen Larry Cogsdill, a junior, and seniors Fred Neimeke, Mike Perry, John Ports and Dan Roof.

Four North Farmington High School football players were named this week to the All-Conference first team in the Northwest Suburban League.

The first team berths going to the Championship Raider squad were Pete Dolan at tackle, Bill Oldershaw at quarterback, Chuck Viane at end and Craig Wyckinsky at fullback.

Also two Raiders, halfback Larry August and center Rick Bensinger, gained Honorable Mention in the balloting by Northwest Suburban League coaches. All six of the North Farmington gridironers are senior players and with the exception of Oldershaw played on both defense and offense for the undefeated Raiders.

NFHS Jr-Varsity Loses One Game

The North Farmington Junior Varsity Football team topped off an outstanding season Thursday, November 11, by beating the Farmington Falcons 27 to 19. Farmington scored first on an interception by Wolfman to make the score 6-0. After NF received the kickoff, they drove 55 yards for a TD on a 16 yard screen pass to Chuck Hill in the second quarter. Hick Scott converted to make the score 14-0. Later in the second quarter the Raiders scored again on a 21 yard reverse by Mike McCoy. Scott again converted. The first half ended with NF leading 14 to 6.

In the second half, several plays after Farmington received the kickoff, Brown scored on a 40 yard run, and the score stood at 14-12. Later, the Raiders sustained a 67 yard drive and scored on a two yard plunge by Steve Heyn's Scott's conversion attempt was wide. North widened the margin to 27-12 late in the fourth quarter on a five yard run by Heyn.

The JV ended their season with a 7-1 overall record and a 4-1 Conference record to finish second in Conference behind Franklin, whom they lost to by only three points 9 to 6. The Raiders shut out every other team they played except for John Glenn and Farmington, allowing only 35 points in eight games to be scored on them, while scoring a total of 162. 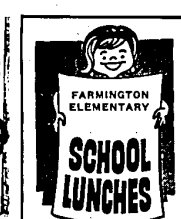
All senior girls attending public or parochial schools in the area are eligible to enter the contest which offers a top prize of a \$250 college scholarship.
