The sanctuary was started in 1865 by the late Jack Miner, whose family is carrying on the tradition of feeding the wild fowl which seek refuge there.

Farmington Garden Club Receives Special Award

Mrs. Keith Willoughby, Secretary and Vice President and Convention Chairman of the Federated Garden Clubs of Michigan, also Landscape Design Chairman of the Farmington Garden Club, was designated an official delegate to the Third Annual Midwestern Conference on Garden Clubs. The conference, sponsored by the Sears Roebuck Company, was held November 15 and 16 at the University of Chicago's Center for Continuing Education.

Since 1951 the National Council of Federated Garden Clubs has made landscape design an area of special study for Garden Club members through landscape design study courses, special meetings, sponsoring public lectures and encouraging participation of members in civic development projects. To further these aims, the Sears Roebuck Company again gave the State of Michigan \$2,000 to be distributed as prizes to eight Michigan Clubs qualifying under stated rules. The Farmington Garden Club, under the able direction of Mrs.

Willoughby, her persevering committee and Mr. Carl Johnson, local landscape architect, submitted their landscape design for the park area at the convergence of Grand River and Oakland Avenues and was awarded District I \$250 cash award.

With this award money added to allocated funds from the Farmington Garden Club treasury, the cooperation of the aforementioned committee and the Farmington City officials, the park area has been cleared.

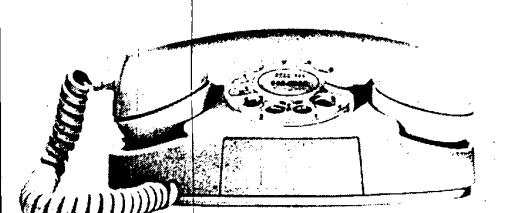
