C. Section 5.11 of the Uniform Traffic Code is amended to read as follows: Violation of Speed Limitations. It shall be unlawful for any person to exceed any of the speed limitations set forth in Section 5.10.

D. Section 5.12 of the Uniform Traffic Code is amended to read as follows: Violation of Signs. It shall be unlawful to exceed the speed stated on signs erected as follows: (a) Traffic Ordinance of this governmental unit or which have been placed or erected by authority of any other public body or official having jurisdiction.

E. Section 5.54 of the Uniform Traffic Code is amended to read as follows: Spilling. No driver of a motor vehicle shall operate his vehicle in such manner as to splash snow, rain, water, mud or dirt or debris on any person lawfully upon a street or highway nor to operate his vehicle in such manner as to splash or throw mud, dirt, gravel or debris upon any other automobile.

F. Section 5.54 of the Uniform Traffic Code is amended to read as follows: Carless Driving. (a) Any person who drives any vehicle upon a highway or frozen public lake, stream, pond or other place open to the general public, including any area designated for the parking of vehicles in a careless or negligent manner so as to endanger any person or property without wantonness or recklessness, shall be deemed to

be guilty of careless driving. The offense of careless driving shall be deemed to be an included offense under a charge of reckless driving in accordance with the preceding paragraph. (c) Every person convicted of reckless driving or careless driving shall be subject to the penalties set forth in Section 5.2 of this Uniform Traffic Code.

G. Section 5.96 of the Uniform Traffic Code, as amended, is amended to read as follows: Race Driving; Improper Starts and Acceleration; Prohibition. It is unlawful for a person to operate a motor vehicle upon a street or highway in a speed contest or for the purpose of making a speed record, including that commonly known as a drag race, whether from a standing start or otherwise over a measured or unmeasured distance, the object of which is to better or defeat one or more contestants on the basis of elapsed time, superior performance or speed. It is further unlawful to start a motor vehicle from a stopped position or to shift from one gear to another at such speed or with such force as to cause the driving wheels of the motor vehicle to skid upon the surface of the roadway. Every driver of a motor vehicle, when accelerating or decelerating, shall do so in a careful and prudent manner and shall shift said vehicle or allow said vehicle to be shifted into a normal driving gear as soon as it is reasonably possible. No driver shall accelerate his automobile so as to create unnecessary or unusual noise.

ORDINANCE NO. 24D
AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE TOWNSHIP OF FARMINGTON, TOWNSHIP OF VILLAGES AND VILLAGES AS ADOPTED FOR THE TOWNSHIP OF FARMINGTON.

Section 1. The Uniform Traffic Code for Cities, Townships and Villages as applicable to the Township of Farmington is hereby amended as follows:

A. Section 3.8 of the Uniform Traffic Code is amended to read as follows: Signal Required. The privileges herein granted to an authorized emergency vehicle shall apply only when the driver of any said vehicle while in motion sounds audible signal by bell, siren or exhaust whistle as may be reasonably necessary and when the vehicle is equipped with at least one (1) lighted lamp displaying a flashing oscillating or rotating light in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 6, Act No. 300, Public Acts of 1949, as amended, except when such lamp is not required by said Act.

B. Section 5.10 of the Uniform Traffic Code is amended to read as follows: Operation of Vehicle on Approach of Authorized Emergency Vehicles. Upon the immediate approach of an authorized emergency vehicle equipped with at least one lighted flashing, rotating or oscillating lamp in accordance with Chapter 6 of Act No. 300, Public Acts of 1949, as amended, unless such lamp is not required by said Act, and when the driver of said authorized emergency vehicle is giving audible signal by siren, exhaust whistle and bell, the driver of every other vehicle shall yield the right-of-way and shall immediately drive to a position parallel to and as close as possible to the right-hand edge of the roadway clear of intersection and remain in such position until the authorized emergency vehicle has passed, except

when otherwise directed by a police officer.
