Twp. Police Detectives Arrest Masked Bandits

Farmington Township Police Detectives arrested four men and a woman this past week, culminating three weeks of intensive investigation following the armed robbery of the Bernadine Golden residence, 29700 13 Mile Road, in Farmington Township.

Township Detectives Russ Conway and William Kelly arrested Ronald Poney, 25, of 20165 Cardoni in Detroit on November 17 after a stake out of several days. Poney had three guns in his possession at the time of his arrest and one of the weapons linked him to the Farmington Township armed robbery on October 22 when three men wearing Halloween masks forced their way into the Golden's home.

Poney, who had no previous police record, was turned over to Detroit Police and charged by them with taking part in the armed robbery there of the Dr. Panick residence.

ARTHUR CARDENES, 25, of 149 Cortland in Highland Park, and two others, Ghazi Dean, 21, of 409 North Campbell in Royal Oak and Marshall Enriquez, 24, no permanent address given, were arrested along with the woman, Georgina Hardsyrie, 19, of 1700 13 Mile Road, in Farmington Township Police.

A total of \$700 in cash and jewelry was taken in the armed robbery of the Golden residence last month.

Open Am. Legion Flag Campaign

Department Commander George S. Frederick of The American Legion, Department of Michigan, recently issued the first supplies of small metal American flags for the lapels of patriotic citizens.

The metal flags are symbols of The American Legion's "Operation Show Your Colors" which is now being observed all over the United States.

The plan, as outlined by Commander Frederick, involves the distribution of some 10 million American flag lapel pins across the country to be worn by all Americans who are in concert with United States Government policy in Viet Nam.

EACH FLAG PIN will be accompanied by a card carrying the message: "Operation Show Your Colors. Americans are serving the cause of freedom in Viet Nam. I wear my country's flag to show that I support their efforts."

Commander Frederick says the flag pins may be obtained from any American Legion post or any American Legion Post.

The Governor's office issued a Proclamation in October of this month declaring the week of Nov. 7-13 as American Legion "Operation Show Your Colors Week" in Michigan.

D. Fulcher in Big Naval Exercise

Bollemar Third Class Duwayne E. Fulcher, USN, son of Mr. Earl Fulcher of 3172 S. Nine Mile, Farmington, participated in the U.S. First Fleet's training exercise "Range Bush" from Nov. 18-24, while serving aboard the guided missile cruiser USS Providence.

The week-long exercise off the coast of Southern California involved ships of the First Fleet and several naval air units, comprising "friendly" forces, in aerial reconnaissance, force, anti-air and anti-submarine warfare operations against the "enemy" air, surface and sub-surface units portrayed by other Navy units.

LEGAL NOTICES

ORDINANCE NO. 30-D An ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 30-A entitled: "An ordinance to provide for the establishment, operation and maintenance of water supply system 'A' to serve water supply system 'A' in the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan." The Township Assessor shall, on request, prepare an allocation, which shall be conclusive and binding upon the Township and the property owner or applicant for connection permit for the issuance and sale of revenue bonds to delay a part of the cost of such acquisition; to provide for the retirement and security of said bonds; and to repeal Ordinance No. 30-A and Ordinance No. 30-B.

WHEREAS, this Township Ordinance No. 30-D adopted on March 30, 1963, adopted Ordinance No. 30-A providing for the establishment of "Water Supply System A" and for the issuance of "Farmington Township Water Supply System A Revenue Bonds of 1963" to the aggregate sum of One Million Five Hundred Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$1,560,000) to delay a part of the cost of acquiring said System; and

WHEREAS, said Ordinance No. 30-A was amended by Ordinance No. 30-B adopted by the Township Board on May 27, 1963, and further amended by Ordinance No. 30-C adopted by the Township Board on July 26, 1963; and

WHEREAS, a further amendment to said Ordinance No. 30-A is necessary in order to provide for additional connection charges in lieu of delinquent special assessments;

THEREFORE, THE TOWNSHIP OF FARMINGTON, OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN, ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. A new Section to be known as Section 12-A is hereby added to said Ordinance No. 30-A.

Section 12-A. At the time a permit is applied for to connect any property within the Township of Farmington to any water main connected directly or indirectly to Water Supply System A, the cost of which water main shall have been specially assessed against said property by the Township, there shall be charged to and collected from the owner of said property or an applicant for a connection permit, in addition to connection charge, in addition to the other charges above provided in this Ordinance, a special assessment equal to the aggregate amount, including interest and penalties, of delinquent special assessments against said property for said water main which are then due and unpaid, whether or not said special assessments are at that time a lien on said property. Installments of special assessments unpaid but not then due which are a lien on said property shall not be included in computing the amount of said additional connection charge, but such installments which are not a lien thereon shall be included in such computation. The Township Assessor shall, on request, prepare an allocation, which shall be conclusive and binding upon the Township and the property owner or applicant for connection permit for the issuance and sale of revenue bonds to delay a part of the cost of such acquisition; to provide for the retirement and security of said bonds; and to repeal Ordinance No. 30-A and Ordinance No. 30-B.

SECTION 2. This Ordinance shall be recorded in the minutes of a regular meeting of the Township Board at which it was adopted, as soon as practicable after its passage, and records shall be authenticated by the signatures of the Supervisor and the Township Clerk.

SECTION 3. Ordinance No. 30-A as amended by Ordinance No. 30-B and Ordinance No. 30-C and this Ordinance No. 30-D is hereby ratified and confirmed.
