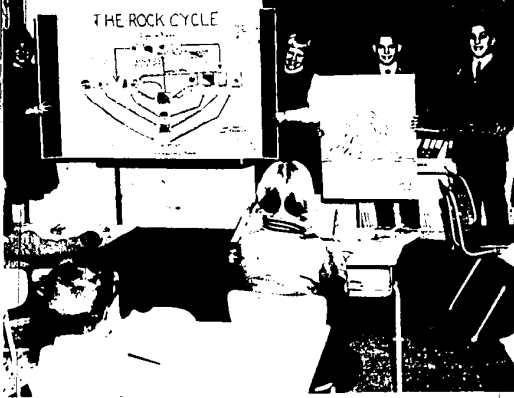

Area Council of PTAs Reports On General Meeting

The Farmington Area Council of PTAs held an open to the public meeting on Wednesday, November 17, at the Farmington Senior High School. Jo Ann Stevenson, Legislative Chairman, with the support of Council President Lorraine LeGros, had arranged a program of education toward the Third Object of the National Congress, "To Secure Adequate Laws For The Care And Protection of Children and Youth".

Dr. Gerald W. Boicourt, Professor of Education at Wayne State University, talked on the relationship of the PTA, as an organization, to legislation. He said the extremes of behavior that are sometimes shown in that are sometimes shown in a situation. To develop a sense of responsibility on a wide scale is desirable, and members of local

PTAs in their interest and the example to their children, are developing that sense of responsibility in the next generation.

WE HAVE TO LOOK forward, he said, to being educated for the future of our lives due to the fast and complex world in which we live. We must feel a responsibility to get the facts and to stand behind them; for the informed man will become a better man and a powerful man. The uninformed and easily swayed can some times do more harm than good.

Representative Raymond L. Baker, who is serving a third term in the Michigan House of Representatives, a pharmacist by trade, and presently a resident of Farmington, spoke on legislation that involves education. He said that state school aid is now over 50 per cent of the first time in ten or twelve years. His audience was taken through the long and often involved path a piece of legislative travel from its presentation to its passing.

FIRST, SAID Mr. Baker, a bill must be presented by a legislator, and often takes a great deal of time to go through the various committees. A bill introduced in January may not be passed until June. People in public utilities and education are among the finest lobbyists.

Mr. Leland B. Clifford, President of the Farmington Board of Education for the sixth year, and Auditing Supervisor of Michigan Bell, outlined school finance and explained that the Board of Education makes policy and the Superintendent and his staff carry out the policy. School business is becoming much more complex than in the past and it is hoped citizens will come to allocation meetings and express themselves.

The meeting closed after a question and answer period to aid people in becoming more knowledgeable on the various aspects of their school system and the legislation that contributes to it.

Desperate For Dental Hygienist

Mr. Nicholas Abid, Principal at the Wm. Grace School and Dr. James C. Rennell, PTA Council Fluoride Chairman, are issuing a plea on behalf of the fluoride program.

Irene Marion, present dental hygienist, is forced to leave on December 3, due to her husband's duty in the Service.

Mr. Abid says the county has eight vacancies to be filled at present so help cannot come from that direction. If a hygienist is not obtained by December 1, a program that has been most successful for the past three years must fall by the wayside. This year promises to be the best to date and is approximately one third of the way through.

If there are hygienists in the area who would like to do a great service to the community, Dr. Rennell knows persons to contact to obtain a temporary license.
