To Disconnect Water Line On Arundel

A water line extending City of Farmington water from Gill Road down Arundel Street to the Longacre School in the township will be abandoned as soon as connection can be made up a township line coming from Grand River up Whitaker Street.

Extension of city water to the school outside the city, at the request of the Farmington School Board, was made back in 1958 with installation of the line being done at the school district's expense.

It was City Manager Dinan's suggestion that the line be abandoned now that a hook-up to the system the township has been made. Councilmen agreed that this should be done as soon as school officials can work out details for a hook-up to the townships system.

In the state of Michigan may not exceed \$10,000.

3. The applicant must have lived and owned property in the State of Michigan for seven consecutive years and reside here at least six months out of each year.

Admittance is expected to be filed between January 1 and March 1, it was stated. Both governmental bodies stated that they would assist applicants in filling out their affidavits for exemptions.

Those who citizens can be exempt from paying local taxes up to \$2,500 of the total state equalized valuation on their property.
