## OLS Wrestler Captures Tourney Championship

Cliff LaFond of Our Lady of Sorrows High School was seeded fifth among some of the state's top wrestlers in the rugged 154-pound weight division going into last weekend's Oakland County Tournament staged on the campus of Oakland University in Rochester, but the Lancer junior took over as the Division Champion by winning five straight matches.

LaFond's formidable opposition included Gary Tippen of Pontiac Northern who was seeded number one in the tourney at 154 pounds for his third place finish last year in the State Finals of Class A wrestling competition and Bob Brochulis of Hazel Park, defending 145-pound State Regional Class A Champion who was only seeded number three in the tourney at 154.

LaFond's fourth opponent was the top-seeded veteran Gary Tippen. LaFond gained a 3-2 decision on riding time from Tippen to set the stage for the 154-pound Finals.

DAN POTTER, Our Lady of Sorrows wrestling coach, said after the finals on Saturday, "LaFond's matches with Tippen and Rodriguez were two of the finest wrestling bouts I've ever witnessed as a coach. They were both close decisions and the boys couldn't have been more evenly matched."

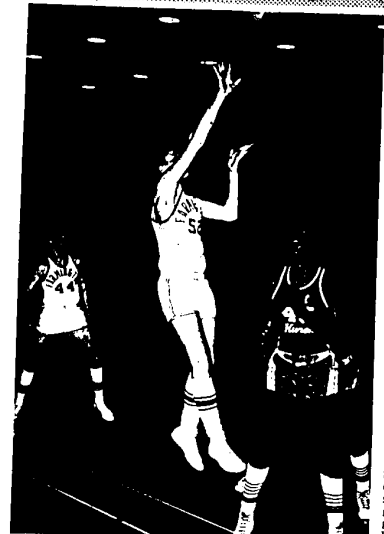
En route to the finals, LaFond disposed of Woodcox from

## Falcons Breeze To Victory Over P. Huron Cagers

Sharp shooting and an aggressive defense allowed Farmington to breeze to its second straight victory by beating the Port Huron Reds, 72-62.

Three scorers hit double figures, providing the Falcons with a balanced attack. Center Mike Ames, besides leading the team in rebounds, tossed in ten buckets and two charity tosses for a total of 22 points. Mike Wilson followed closely with 21 points. Junior Greg Dorow netted 14, including six long jump shots from outside. Gerald Noble led Port Huron with 18.

Port Huron was in the game for only five minutes. With the Reds leading 10-9, Steve Moore canned two free throws to put the Falcons ahead to stay.

Farmington employed a full court press which confused the Big Reds. With Wilson and Dorow "burning" jumpers from outside, and with Ames and Moore providing the muscle under the boards, the Falcons exploded to a 38-26 half-time advantage.

In the second half, as much as 20 points separated the two clubs. The big score permitted

tempts. They also sank 10 of 15 from the free throw line.

Coach Jack Quigley was quite pleased with his club's rebounding success and fullcourt press. He also added, "One important factor was that everyone got to play. This experience will prove invaluable later on during the season."

Tomorrow night's contest at East Detroit provides the Falcons with a big test of their ability. The Shamrocks are generally rated in cage circles as one of the area's top powers.

## Raider Wrestlers Compete in Tourney

On Friday and Saturday, December 10th and 11th, the North Farmington wrestling team competed in the Oakland County Wrestling Tournament at Oakland University in Pontiac.

Sixteen schools, with two wrestlers in each of the twelve weight classes from each school, participated. This is the largest tournament of the year with very stiff competition and in the state competing.

Placing in the tournament is an honor won with much difficulty and good wrestling, and it takes a top wrestler to do so.

Good performances were turned in by several NF wrestlers. Ray Roberts, wrestling in the 145 weight class, won his first four matches to gain a berth in the finals, but lost a close 4-2 decision to a Walled Lake opponent to take second.

Dick Allen, at 165, won his first three matches and then lost a very close match to top seeded Hollis, of Pontiac Central, who was third in the state last year. When a wrestler loses to an opponent who makes it to the finals, he gets a chance in the consolation brackets to make it to the consolation finals, or 3rd and 4th place. Allen wrestled on to the consolation finals, where he lost a close match and settled for 4th.

Rick Gunderlock, 103-wrestler, won his first two matches with first period pins but was severely hampered by an injury to his neck and left arm and shoulder as he was decided by a Lance Cruz opponent who went on to take second.

Rick had a very good chance for a 3rd place in the consolation but was forced to drop out of the tournament because of his injury. Jim Dragan, at 112, and Mark Campbell, at 127, both made strong bids to place in the tournament but were narrowly beaten in their consolation matches that would have allowed them to reach the consolation finals for 4th and try for 3rd.

Dragan won his first two matches, averaging an earlier loss in a dual meet to a Farmington opponent in his first match. In his third match he

was

decided by Nicolay, of Walled Lake, who won the tournament. He went on to win again in the consolation, but was beaten on riding time as he tried to gain the consolation finals.

Campbell won his first three matches and then lost to a corral, of Warren Fitzgerald, who was 4th in the state last year and who won the tournament. Campbell was also beaten by one point in his match for the consolation finals.

Craig Wycinski, wrestling heavyweight, won his first two matches with pins and then was defeated by one point by the wrestler who went on to win the tournament.

On Thursday, December 2nd, NF was defeated in their opening dual meet by Farmington, 23 to 17. Decisions were gained by Campbell, Roberts, Allen, and Wycinski, and Gunderlock pinned his man.

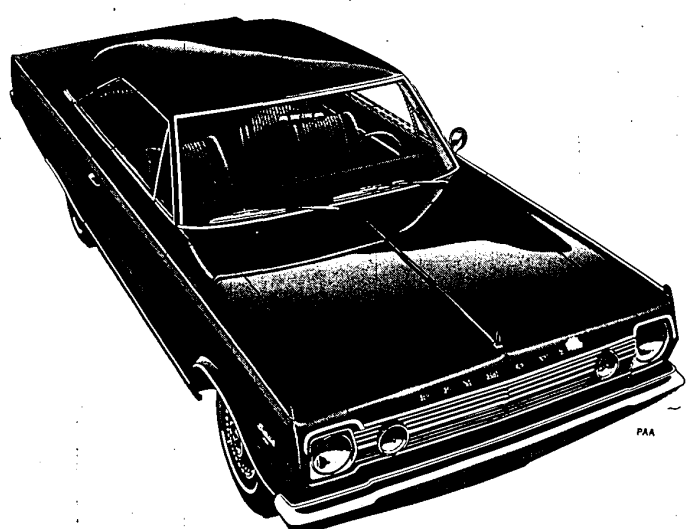
The following Tuesday NF defeated Clarenceville 27-21. Sophomores Scott Mosher and Dan Haller, at 55 and 120, both pinned their opponents. Decisions were gained by Campbell, Lance Oak, Roberts, Allen, and Wycinski. Dragan clinched his opponent 13-0 but his match did not count because he was not allowed any extra time to make weight because of a mistake in the scheduling of the meet.
