The Clarenceville High School wrestling team opens the heavy end of its 1965-66 schedule January 11 at Redford Union riding on the crest of a 3-1 dual meet record.

Trojan wrestling coach Ralph Temby has three boys who remain unbeaten in dual meet competition, 100-pounder Don Ullitalo, 127-pounder Ray Wehner and 145-pounder Dave Kaiapo.

Clarenceville downed Garden City West, 27 to 16, in their last wrestling meet. Earlier victims were Farmington High School.

## NOVEMBER

Appoint Chairmen

John K. Cotton and Harley Walters were appointed co-chairmen of the Second Annual Farmington Founders' Festival to be staged in July of 1966.

## Annexation Fails

The attempt by the City of Farmington to annex about 500 acres from Farmington Township failed. The vote was 85 in favor of annexation to 60 in favor.

## Teacher Award

Harry M. Rehn, a teacher at Cloverdale Elementary School, was presented with the "Outstanding Young Educator Award" by the Farmington Junior Chamber of Commerce.

## Township Petitions

Farmington Township officials filed petitions aimed at incorporating the Township into a City. Township officials made the move, they said, to protect their boundaries from annexation by neighboring cities.

## Undefeated Team

The North Farmington High School football team posted a perfect 9-0 record for their first undefeated season. Raider quarterback Bill Oldershaw was named to the All-State Football Team.

## Associate Judge

The son of the late Judge Sylvester J. Pheneby, Dennis, a graduate of the University of Detroit Law School, was appointed Associate Municipal Judge for the City of Farmington by action of the Farmington City Council.

## School Proposals

Less than 12 percent of the eligible voters in the Farmington School District took part in the may election November 15. Voters approved a \$1 million dollar bond issue, approved renewal of a millage issue for operating expenses and voted to increase the operating millage for the District.

## DECEMBER

### Winter Tax Bill

The total tax bill sent out by the City and Township of Farmington combined hit \$3.3 million dollars, the winter tax bill for 1965.

## Junior Miss

## Goodfellows

The Farmington Goodfellows raised a record \$3,500 with their annual sale of the Farmington Enterprise Goodfellow Newspaper Edition. More than 100 needy families in the community gained assistance from the Goodfellows at Christmas time.

## Ground Breaking

Governor Romney attended ground breaking ceremonies at the site of the new Orchard Ridge Community College in Farmington Township.

## School Trustee

John Washburn of 21044 Birchwood was appointed to the Farmington School District Board of Education to fill the unexpired term of Sylvia Schwartz who resigned.

## YMCA Leader Honored

Robert L. Williams, retiring Executive Chairman of the Farmington YMCA Board of Management, was honored for his three-year tenure of "Y" directorship which saw the organization grow to branch status.

## New Trustee

Thomas R. Nolan was appointed to the Farmington Township Board as the new Trustee to replace Byron Walter who stepped down to assume new duties as the Township Justice of the Peace.

## AUGUST

### Union Position

The Farmington Township Board took a position on union representation for its employees. The Board expressed the feeling a single union, representing all employees, rather than separate bargaining agents for various employee groups which would tend to involve Township officials in prolonged and involved negotiations, should be established.

## New Grid Coach

Richard T. Tyler was named head football coach at Farmington High School replacing Jack Hayes who resigned to assume similar duties at Jackson Junior College. Tyler had served as assistant football coach under Hayes.

## Rev. Eddy Resigns

Rev. Robert Eddy officially resigned as chairman of the Farmington Youth Guidance Committee. Pressure for his resignation had been exerted since his controversial views on the sexual relationships of teenagers, expressed from his pul-

## Enrollment Up

The number of students registered for classes at Farmington schools is up 1,780 over last year for a total of 19,580. Most of the students, 14,222, will be attending classes in the Farmington Public Schools.

### Trained for Combat

Marine Private Theodore P. Mehl, son of the Rev. and Mrs. Carl E. Mehl of 28722 Farmington Road in Farmington, has completed individual combat training with the Second Infantry Training Regiment at the Marine Corps Base, Camp Pendleton, Calif.

The course included instruction under simulated combat conditions, small unit tactics in both conventional and guerrilla warfare, day and night combat, reconnaissance and combat patrolling, and the effective use of infantry weapons.

He is undergoing basic specialist training in his military occupational field. These occupational fields include artillery, infantry, motor transport and supply. Marines assigned duties with infantry units will be taught infantry sub-specialties, such as the machine gun, grenade launcher, rifle or mortar.

Marines assigned to highly technical specialties have been sent to a military technical school for their specialist training.

The Leathernecks bound for the Pacific will receive additional training at the Staging Battalion at Camp Pendleton, Calif. This training will emphasize jungle warfare, patrolling and civic action, based on experiences gained in Viet Nam.
