

To Open Series Of Art Classes

A new 5-week series of art classes for Farmington area students will begin soon in the Farmington area. The classes are sponsored by the Detroit Institute of Art in cooperation with the Farmington Public Schools for students of the area interested in additional art experiences.

Students in grades from one to four will meet in the first session on February 3 while those in grades five to 12 will meet on March 12 at Farmington Senior High School, 32000 Shawansee. Because of the crowded conditions at the high school subsequent class sessions of both groups will be held at Larkshire school. Students at the first session will be given directions to the Larkshire school site which is Farmington's newest school.

IN THE PAST, participation in the Farmington area classes has passed that of other suburban centers. It should be noted, Robert Benjamin, Farmington Elementary Art Consultant stated, that the classes are not limited to participation by only talented students. Those students with a genuine interest in art are invited to come.
