Injuries Hurt OLS Mat Team

The Our Lady of Sorrows wrestling team sustained more bad news this week both on and off the mats as a promising freshman grappler, 154-pound Mark Tucker, broke his leg in an ice skating accident Saturday night and the Lancer team lost their fifth straight dual meet Thursday, Jan. 19, bowing to Whitmore Lake, 27 to 22.

Lancer coach Dan Potter has already seen the ranks of the team thinned by injuries to key men and Tucker's broken leg followed news that a back injury will sideline senior heavy-weight Steve Queen for the remainder of the season. As if that wasn't quite enough of woe for one coach, Brian Maes, the 120-pounder, was injured, sprained his ankle in the Whitmore Lake meet and will be out of action for the next three or four weeks.

A NOTE OF CHEER did creep into the Lancer wrestling picture last week as two veterans on the injured list, 95-pounder John Abowd and junior Cliff LaFond at 154, returned to action and scored pins in their matches against Whitmore Lake. Abowd had been out for three weeks with a broken finger and LaFond had been hobbled since his championship performance in the Oakland County Meet December 11.

Terry Caillouette, the Lancer veteran who wrestled in the tough 180-pound weight division against Whitmore Lake, provided coach Potter with more encouragement as he pinned his opponent in the fast time of 7:30 decision to cap the score at 27-22.

ONE OF THE principal reasons the meet remained in reach of Lancers until the final match was due to the outstanding performance of Tucker in the 165-pound weight division. Although normally a 154-pound grappler, Tucker moved up to prevent a five-point OLS deficit, visitors who had to settle for a

came last year in the Regional Tournament where he went on to win the weight division Championship. OLS will enter "Fain Flat Rock this Thursday, January 20, in the OLS gym, 7:30 p.m.

The Lancer matmen get their next action at the Cornum Quadrangular with the host school (Cornum), Flint Bender, St. Michael's of Maple Grove and OLS slated in the Saturday, January 22, competition.

Trojan Wrestlers Extend Win Streak

The Clarencville High School wrestling team traveled to Northville tomorrow night, January 20, in quest of its fifth straight dual meet victory of the 1965-66 season.

The Trojan grapplers, coached by grid mentor Ralph Tenby, have a 4-1 record going into their meet this Thursday in the Mustang gym and three of the CHS matmen remain undefeated.

JIM PRISK, a senior heavy-weight who co-captained the Trojan football team, continues to show his strength in wrestling, a sport he joined for the first time this past fall. Prisk defeated a tough Redford Union opponent, Denprino, 2-0, in his last outing when CHS claimed its fourth straight win, 27 to 12.

Extending their undefeated strings for Clarencville at Redford Union were 105-pounder Don Yillato, 129-pounder Ray Weber and Dave Kalpio at 147-pounds.

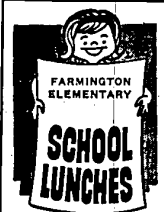


Bowling

Falcons Beat Vikings 87-86

Farmington roared back to life Friday night before Channel 50 television cameras with an impressive 87-86 victory over the Walled Lake Vikings. The victory evened the Falcons' record at 1-1 for conference play.

The Falcon cagers were in complete control throughout the entire contest, holding the Vikings to a 10 point deficit in the course of the game.

Mike Wilson and Greg Dorow contributed over half of the team's total points. Wilson had a hot hand as he hit for 29 points, 19 of those coming in the first half. Junior Greg Dorow, who has scored in double figures every game this year, followed in the scoring column with 21. Steve Moore and Al Kilka contributed nine points apiece.

John Huebner paced the Vikings scoring attack with 17 points. He was followed by Mike Harland and Larry Grinell with 14 and 12, respectively.

Good shooting by Wilson and Dorow boosted the Falcons into an early lead in the first half. Towards the end of the second quarter, however, the Walled Lake defense stiffened, slowing down Farmington's attack.

The Falcons came back strong in the second half, playing a sound defensive game. They held the Vikings to 16 points throughout the remaining quarters.

Farmington now has a total win record of 5-4. Tomorrow night, the game which could well determine the final standings in the Lakes Conference will be played. Farmington will host Pontiac Northern.

Roberts has one of the finest dual meet records, nine victories against just one defeat, and along with team-mate Craig Wycinsky who totals a very respectable 8-2 record, provides coach Hupp with his headiest performers.

Raider Dick Allen was decisively, 7-4, by his Dondero opponent for what could be termed an upset in the 165-pound match. Allen has a fine, 8-3 record and placed fourth in his division at the Oakland County Tournament ahead of the man who beat him, Russ Hancock. Allen, along with Gunderlock, Roberts and Wycinsky, all have the habit of pinning their mat foes.

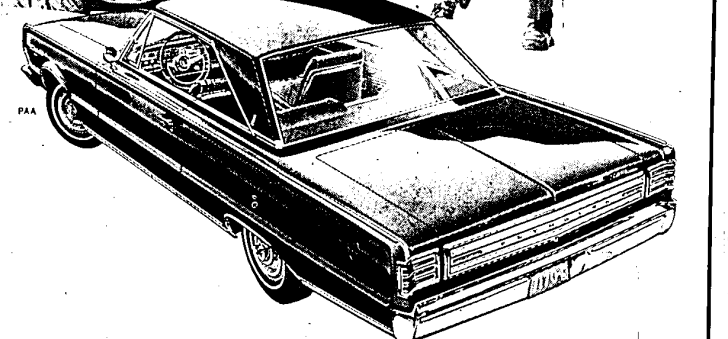
