\$73,849.00, while the entire Township—including the target area—will have an assessed value of \$87,044.00. The report showed that, if the industrial area were annexed, the net revenue would be \$442,194.

The principal questions asked at the meeting were as follows: QUESTION: There are Federal grants available for Urban Renewal. Are these grants available only under a home rule city?

ANSWER: No, it is not necessary to be a city to qualify for Federal grants for Urban Renewal. Townships may initiate renewal projects. If it needs doing in Farmington, it will probably be done whether we are a city or not.

QUESTION: What additional benefits are we going to derive

as a City? What about the \$423,000 we will spend for roads? What services are we going to have to provide for the "new" residents?

ANSWER: Besides protecting ourselves from annexation, the projected budget shows that we could operate as a City on the same budget as we are now, or surplus, of \$12,500. As for services to the villages, they would receive the same services that they are now receiving from the Township. We could also take over maintenance of the village roads which they are now doing for themselves. The money being allocated to them from gas and weight taxes would all go to the City for use in the entire City.

QUESTION: We have a man-ual of Township government and it appears to us that any part of either a City or Township can be annexed by a vote of the people.

ANSWER: Under a City government all of the citizens in the City must vote "Yes" before any part of the City can be annexed by another municipality. Under a Township government only those citizens living in the area proposed for annexation may vote on the question.

QUESTION: If the two villages were not included in the incorporation, and the Township decided to incorporate, the two villages would then be the only area to make up the Township of Farmington, wouldn't they?

ANSWER: Yes. Then the villages would be faced with the problem of setting up a Township government and providing the services necessary under such a government.

QUESTION: Wouldn't a City government have to give the people better service on rubbish removal than the Township does?

ANSWER: Not necessarily. A City government would be under no obligation to provide more service in any area. Under either type of government we get the services we want and are willing to pay for.

QUESTION: Would a City government how do the people get better service?

ANSWER: The Charter Commission can decide to retain the present level of services and taxes. If the people want more service, they would have to vote to amend the charter and the final drafting and submission back to the Council. The repeal of the metal roadway requirements in the present code would be postponed until revisions in the ordinance can be further studied by the City Manager and Attorney.

# Bel-Aire Sewer Problem Aired

A Bel-Aire subdivision resident appeared before the City Council Monday night, March 7, to complain about what he claims is a faulty sewer in front of his house on Colchester.

Boyd Baker of 23283 Colchester told the Council he has failed to get any action on his sewer problem and claims it has cost him \$2,500 over the past five years to repair damage caused by the flooding of his basement.

CITY MANAGER John Dinan told the Council a recent inspection of the line in front of Baker's house revealed no apparent reason for blockage that could result in sewage backing up but said further studies will be made in an effort to solve the problem.

Two possible methods of helping to solve the problem were outlined by Dinan. The first would cost \$500 and would only require the installation of a three-car crash similar to one in use at Eight Mile Road in Farmington Road. This would give the City DPW a warning when the sewer is acting up and allow them time to repair or correct the problem. The other alternative, Dinan said, would be the construction of an eight-inch sewer which would cost an estimated \$2,000. He emphasized further study was needed to assure either approach would correct Baker's problem.
