Record Sales For State Farm

State Farm Mutual barely managed the break-even point on its 1965 insurance business as it recorded sales of \$22,973,227. Assets of the company topped the billion dollar mark for the first time.

After dividends to policyholders were paid, the company showed a profit for the year on insurance operations of \$59,587—less than one-tenth of one percent of sales. The net figure represented a gross underwriting return of \$9,681,129, less policyholder dividends of \$9,681,442.

FRED P. SAMRA, who represents State Farm in Farmington and has his office at 32300 Grand River Avenue, said that though the margin was thin, the picture was better than 1964 when a similar figure showed a loss of over \$33 million.

President Edward B. Rust said it was the first time in three years that the company's auto insurance operation had climbed into the black. He doubted, however, that the turn of profit indicated a turn in the underwriting trend which has been steadily worsening in recent years.

Rust said inflationary trends in "everything the insurance industry touches" coupled with a sharp increase in the number of autos on the road and steadily rising accident tolls, were major concerns of the auto insurance industry.

Two Churches Combine For Communion Service

Episcopalians and Presbyterians in Farmington will unite for a joint observance of Maundy Thursday this year. Trinity Episcopal Church and the First Presbyterian Church will sponsor an Ecumenical Communion of the Institution of the Lord's Supper on Maundy Thursday evening, April 7, at 8 p.m. The service, which will be held at the First Presbyterian Church, 26165 Farmington Road, will be a celebration of the Holy Communion according to the liturgy of the Church of South India.

The Church of South India was inaugurated in 1947 as a union of the former South India United Church (Presbyterian-Congregational), the Methodist Church of South India and the southern dioceses of the Anglican (Episcopal) Church of India, Pakistan, Burma and Ceylon. It represents one of the major Church unions successfully completed since the time of the Protestant Reformation. The "Liturgy of the Church of South India" combines elements from the forms of worship of each of the uniting churches, including an interesting ceremony in which a "Greeting of Peace" is exchanged in the midst of the service between all members of the congregation, beginning with the clergy and spreading to the choir and entire congregation.

The Rev. George Ramsey, pastor, and Rev. Robert Sawyer, assistant at the First Presbyterian Church, and the Rev. Joseph Pelham, rector of Trinity Episcopal Church, will conduct the service. The Chancel Choir of the First Presbyterian Church will sing the offertory anthems under the direction of Mr. Melvin Rookus, organist and Mr. John Cross, director of music. The Choir of Trinity Episcopal Church will sing the service music under the direction of Mrs. John D. Smith, choir director, and Mrs. James Warner, organist. The Session of the Presbyterian Church and the Vestry of Trinity Episcopal Church will take part in the procession preceding the service.

Dr. Milton H. Bank To Conclude Orchard Church Lenten Series

Orchard Methodist Church has been the scene of special midweek Lenten services for the past four Thursdays. The concluding program of the series will take place March 31, at 8 p.m. with Dr. Milton H. Bank of Pontiac Central Methodist as the speaker. His sermon topic: "A Terribly Personal Question."

Dr. Bank holds several degrees from Baldwin Wallace College and Boston University. He has served churches in the Michigan area since 1936, having been the Minister at Pontiac Central for the past 17 years.

Special music will be provided by the adult chancel choir, under the direction of Mr. Edward Johns. The organist will be Mark Atkin.

Palm Sunday will find a class service. They have been meeting with Rev. Eddy every Saturday morning for two months for their instruction. Easter Sunday service will begin with the sunrise service and breakfast at 7 p.m. by the two MYF groups. The regular worship services and church school will be conducted at 9:30 and 11 a.m.

Organ Concert Set At North

Albert G. Bolltho will give an organ recital at North Congregational Church, Northwestern Highway at Lahser, Sunday evening, April 3, at 7:30 p.m. His program will consist of works from the Baroque Era with works by Gabrieli, Frescobaldi, Bach and Handel.

He will be assisted by a brass quartet from the Henry Ford Community College, Donald Cross and Thomas Marko, trombones; and Joseph Graybowski and Walter Sladewski, trumpets. The public is invited.

Mr. Bolltho, organist and director of music at North Church and chairman of the music department of Henry Ford Community College, has been on sabbatical leave from these two organizations since last September. He has been working on his Ph.D. at Michigan State University, studying with Dr. Corliss Aronson.

A graduate of Wayne State University with both bachelor and master's degrees, he has a varied musical background, having studied organ with Dr. F. Dudley Vernon at Wayne University and with Dr. Robert Noehren at the University of Michigan, as well as completing a master course with Marcel Dupre of France.
