Their active choregraphy built the total excitement of this fine production to a vivid, vibrant peak of perfection.

"The Trojan Women" ran almost a year off-Broadway with Mildred Dunnock in the lead role. She was the only individual truly missed. The young lady taking over for her did a noble job, but was not quite up to the task. However, one flaw in otherwise loop-flight production in no way made this U of M Professional Theater presentation anything except apperb.


