• Denied a rezoning request to multiple residential from the Wellesley Development Corp. for a portion of the Colony Park Subdivision at 13 Mile and Farmington Rds.
• Set a public hearing April 28 for a rezoning request from RA-4 to a commercial classification for six lots on Shilwassee Rd. during Purdue and Colgate Six.
• Adjourned for a month a rezoning request which would permit the Convalescent Home on Middlebelt to expand. This was done so that the owners, Mr. and Mrs. Orville Hutcheson, would have an opportunity to bring the proposal more in line with the requirements of the rezoning ordinance.
