Parents, Teens to Explore Concerns of Livonia Youth

A citywide conference for Livonia teenagers and their parents will explore the questions of drinking, smoking and vandalism Saturday, May 7, at Franklin High School.

Sponsored by the Livonia Commission on Children and Youth, the conference is an outgrowth of a recent survey taken by the group in which 2400 teenagers and adults responded to questions about problems facing young people.

Eight panel discussions will be held under the general title of "Parent and Youth Look at..." Among the topics to be considered are: Leisure Time, Smoking Problem, Drinking Problem, Personal Appearance, Respect for Another's Property, Driving Problems, Sex and Parent-Child Understanding.

"The workshop," members of the Commission said, "is being held to create a better understanding of the problems facing the youth of Livonia, as well as an awareness for the need of recognizing standards of behavior for all citizens."

"We hope to pinpoint the problems of Livonia's young people and to determine what we can do to meet these concerns."

The workshop will begin at 9:30 a.m. and continue to 3:30 p.m. All persons who filled out the questionnaire are receiving invitations to participate and may send a postcard to the Livonia Commission on Children and Youth, 35001 Five Mile, Livonia, indicating which panel they would like to attend.
