Evans Sees Earnings at New High

PORTLAND, Ore. — Record sales and earnings for Evans Products Company in 1966 were predicted by Monford A. Orloff, Chairman and Chief Executive Officer, at the annual meeting of shareholders here.

He said that demand of railcars and railway equipment had produced highest-ever backlog in the Transportation Equipment Group, that favorable plywood price levels have enhanced the profits of the Building Products Group, and that the Capp-Homes Division's completed homes and orders booked were at the highest level in its history.

The 1966 sales are currently estimated at approximately \$300 million, and per share earnings at approximately \$3.55, Orloff said. Sales in 1965 were \$247 million, and net earnings were \$2.96 per common share, both records high. Orloff further noted that both sales and earnings for the first quarter of 1966 were up 26 percent over the same period of 1965.

The shareholders elected two new directors and nine incumbents. The directors are Crocker Nevill, Executive Vice President of Western Midland Grace Trust Company of New York, and H. H. Rousseau of Wilton, Conn., formerly an officer and director of Moore's Super Stores, Inc., which Evans acquired in 1965.

Retiring from the Board are Irving Goldfeder, Executive Vice President of Hunt Foods and Industries, Inc., and Emory E. Moore, Vice President of Evans.

Shareholders also voted to increase the authorized capital stock from 4,000,000 to 10,000,000 common shares and from 350,000 to 3,000,000 preferred shares, approved a new stock option plan covering 200,000 common shares, and approved a by-law amendment to permit payment of annual fees to outside directors.

Spring Is Quiet, Safe Without Skateboard

ANN ARBOR—What's spring this year without the once popular rattle of skateboards? "It's safer — especially for young boys," says Dr. Stanley J. Schuman, associate professor of epidemiology at The University of Michigan.

At a recent Child Safety Symposium in Virginia, Dr. Schuman presented an epidemiologic round-up of the 1965 skateboard crash, its timing, extent of morbidity and risk to age groups.

Last spring, 90 per cent of Ann Arbor's youngsters relied down driveways, sidewalks and streets. One of every four skateboard enthusiasts suffered injury and one out of 100 fractured bones. Ann Arbor was but one of many communities struck by the mania. Hospitalization for "falls" climbed sharply in 21 large hospitals through Indiana, Michigan and Ohio.

Timing the fad was literally "no accident," he said. (An enterprising agent first sold 500 skateboards to securities as spring party favors. Susceptible students on balmy spring afternoons.

Local sales shot from 50 on March 25 to 450 on April 2. Recorded complaints of noise from skateboards closely followed the sales record. The fad spread and the younger set suffered. Seven of 10 fractures among Ann Arbor school children occurred in age groups 10 and 11. Of 33 skateboard fractures reported at another campus community, the

two most severe fractures involved an 11-year old boy (skull fracture) and a boy, 12, (compound fracture).

These injuries rose from zero on February 1 to 210 the first of May.

It is not surprising, said Dr. Schuman, that boys accounted for 77 per cent of all fractures reported. It is also well known, he said, that a year or two difference in chronological age may make a significant difference in coordination and margins of safety. Risk-taking behavior, cheaper and inferior equipment, and other factors contribute to more severe injuries in 10 to 12-year-old boys. Dr. Schuman said studies of sport injuries such as this may indicate which age groups could benefit most from preventive sport-safety measures. His study involved a survey of 3,184 school children.

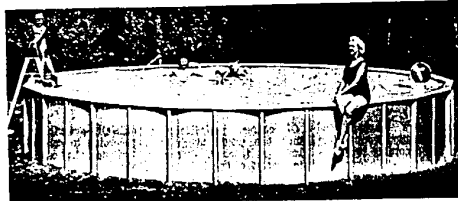

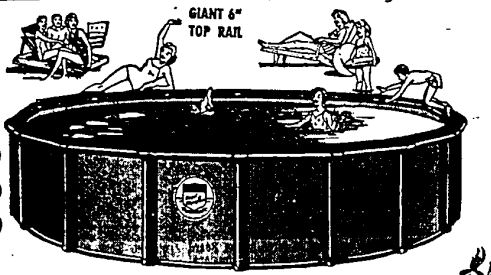
