Film Session
Slated at UD
An international selection of
motion pictures will be studied
and analyzed as part of the
University of Detroit Summer
Film Conference and Workshop
from June 27 to August 8.
Meetings will be held in the
Kew-Forest Theatre adjacent to
the U. of D. campus. The conference,
which runs from June 27 to July 8, consists
of an intensive eight days of
film viewing and discussion.
Eight films of outstanding
merit will be shown in the
morning session and groups will
split up for discussion directed
by a film specialist. After lunch
the film is screened a second
time and a longer general discussion
follows with a panel of
film specialists and critics.
Purpose of the conference is
to assist in determining artistic
and technical norms for
judging films and to establish
basic patterns for film discussion
in schools and colleges.
The Film Workshop begins
with the Conference and continues
through Aug. 5 with two
courses and a longer general discussion,
taught from 9 to 12
days and History and Development
of the Film, presented from
9 to 12 daily and from 1 to 11
in the afternoon beginning
July 11. Both courses will use
films from the various "schools"
as illustrations.
Among the motion pictures to
be seen are: "The Virgin
Spring," "Richard III," "The
Bridge on the River Kwai,"
"Hud," "The Hustler," "La
Strada," "Milk and Honey,"
"The Death of a Salesman,"
"The Guest," "The Day
After Tomorrow," "The Corn is
Green," "Winter Light," "The
Seventh Seal," "Through a
Glass Darkly," "The Sporting
Life," "Desire Under the
Elms," "A Place in the Sun,"
and "La Dolce Vita."
