Baker Wants To Name 696 Adler Hwy.

State Representative Raymond L. Baker, Farmington Republican, has introduced a concurrent resolution to designate a portion of interstate 1-696 as the Adler Memorial Highway in memory of the late Rabbi Morris Adler.

Rabbi Adler died on March 11 as a result of gunshot wounds suffered a month earlier while he was conducting services for the Congregation Shaarey Zedek in Southfield.

Baker said the idea for dedicating the highway between Eight Mile and Telegraph Roads, a stretch which runs by Shaarey Zedek, came from Mrs. Victor Morgensater of Detroit.

She had the thought while returning home from funeral services for Rabbi Adler. She communicated the suggestion to Governor Romney who presented it to the Southfield City Council, which in turn endorsed the idea. It was later discovered from the Highway Department that the legislature could dedicate the unnamed section of road which is temporarily designated as I-696.

Baker described Rabbi Adler as a "great humanitarian" and as one "who made many lasting contributions to the Detroit metropolitan area and all Michigan."

"The designation of this highway as the Adler Memorial Highway will be a suitable and lasting memorial to this great man," he said.
