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Eggs and the Bride

"An egg is an object which in its natural state is enclosed in a very brittle shell. When you wish to open one, crack it smartly in the middle across the sharp edge of some stable device, such as a thin-sided bowl. Place a saucer underneath it to catch the meat."

The above excellent advice comes from "Simplicity in Her Shoe" (Phyllis McGinley, McMillan Co., New York). Go ahead and try it. Crack it smartly, but don't smash it.

If you are eager to be adequate, even, as a cook, you will soon learn to have to come to terms with the egg. The egg is an amazing commodity. The shell is beautiful, whether white or brown. It is perfectly designed, with balance, symmetry, grace, and strength. It is a packaging idea that has never been matched by any other skill and cunning of man. To think the hen does it all by herself, mostly!

Inside this neat little container with its appealingly shiny, iridescent, remarkable fruit which can be used for what seems an infinite variety of culinary purposes, changing its character and personality radically, and often.

The egg can be used to:
Leaven — by beating to make light and airy, as in cakes.
Thicken — by cooking in custards, puddings, and sauces.
Coat — in breading meats and fish, and some vegetables.
Bind — when mixed with meat leaves a creamy consistency. Emulsify — in combining liquids, as in salad dressings.
Clarify — in the preparation of consommé or in "boiled" coffee.

In addition, those qualities, the egg's color, richness, and flavor to all sorts of dishes. As for this weren't enough, eggs can be cooked and eaten all by themselves. If you are learning to crack an egg, plan on serving scrambled eggs because you will not doubt stick your thumb into a couple.

To scramble eggs for two crack 4 eggs into a small bowl. Add 2 1/2-3 tablespoons of water, milk or light cream and stir together till the yolks and whites are fairly well combined. Add 1/8 teaspoon salt and 1/8 teaspoon paprika. Place 1 tablespoon butter in a small skillet, and

heat till butter is foamy (don't let it get brown). Reduce heat to low and pour eggs into skillet. Stir lightly occasionally, moving the eggs up off the bottom as they cook. It doesn't take more than a few minutes. Done depends upon your preference, and ranges from set but still shiny to light and dry.

Once you can regularly remove the egg intact from the shell, the horizons broaden. You may find in your cook book many ways to use eggs fried and poached and otherwise.

Perhaps the simplest thing to begin on is baked eggs, but if you are a reluctant riser or rushed most mornings, do this when you needn't hurry, because they take a little time.

BAKED EGGS: Break shells and slide 1 or 2 eggs into buttered shallow individual baking dishes, or used buttered paper cupcake cups set into muffin tins. Sprinkle a little salt and paprika on top. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for 12 to 18 minutes, depending upon how firm you like them.

It is that simple. As your skill and confidence grow, try these variations:

(1) Line bottom of dishes with buttered crumbs, which are made by browning 1/3 cup fine bread crumbs in 2 tablespoons of butter in a small pan. Circle a strip of partially cooked bacon around the edge of the dish, add eggs, and top with crumbs.

(2) Line bottom of dish with buttered crumbs, place a thin slice of cheese on the crumbs, add the eggs. Top with grated cheese or more crumbs.

(3) Pour 1 to 2 tablespoons cream into dish before adding eggs.

(4) Place a buttered toast round in bottom of dish. Add a small slice of tomato, a slice of chopped onion, and then the eggs.

There are a couple of extra things you should know about eggs. They should always be fresh and kept refrigerated. They must always be cooked with gentle heat, for they are tender and fragile.

Speaking of fragility, if you drop one on the floor, it will break and be wasted, an event that makes me feel very guilty. Think of that poor hen doing all that work for nothing!

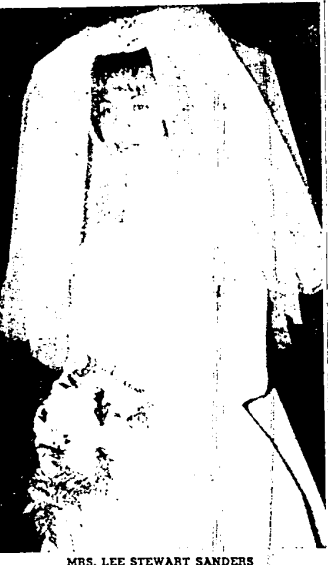
G. C. Buxom Belles Hold "Recognition Party"
