County Death Rate Up

Nineteen traffic fatalities were recorded in Oakland County in June, as compared to eight for the same month last year, the Traffic Improvement Association of Oakland County (TIA) has reported.

The cumulative death toll in Oakland County for the first six months of 1968 stood at 71, exactly equal to the number of traffic fatalities occurring during the same period in 1967, TIA said.

In contrast to Oakland County, the incidence of traffic deaths has been running approximately 18 per cent ahead of last year in the state and approximately six per cent higher in the nation.
